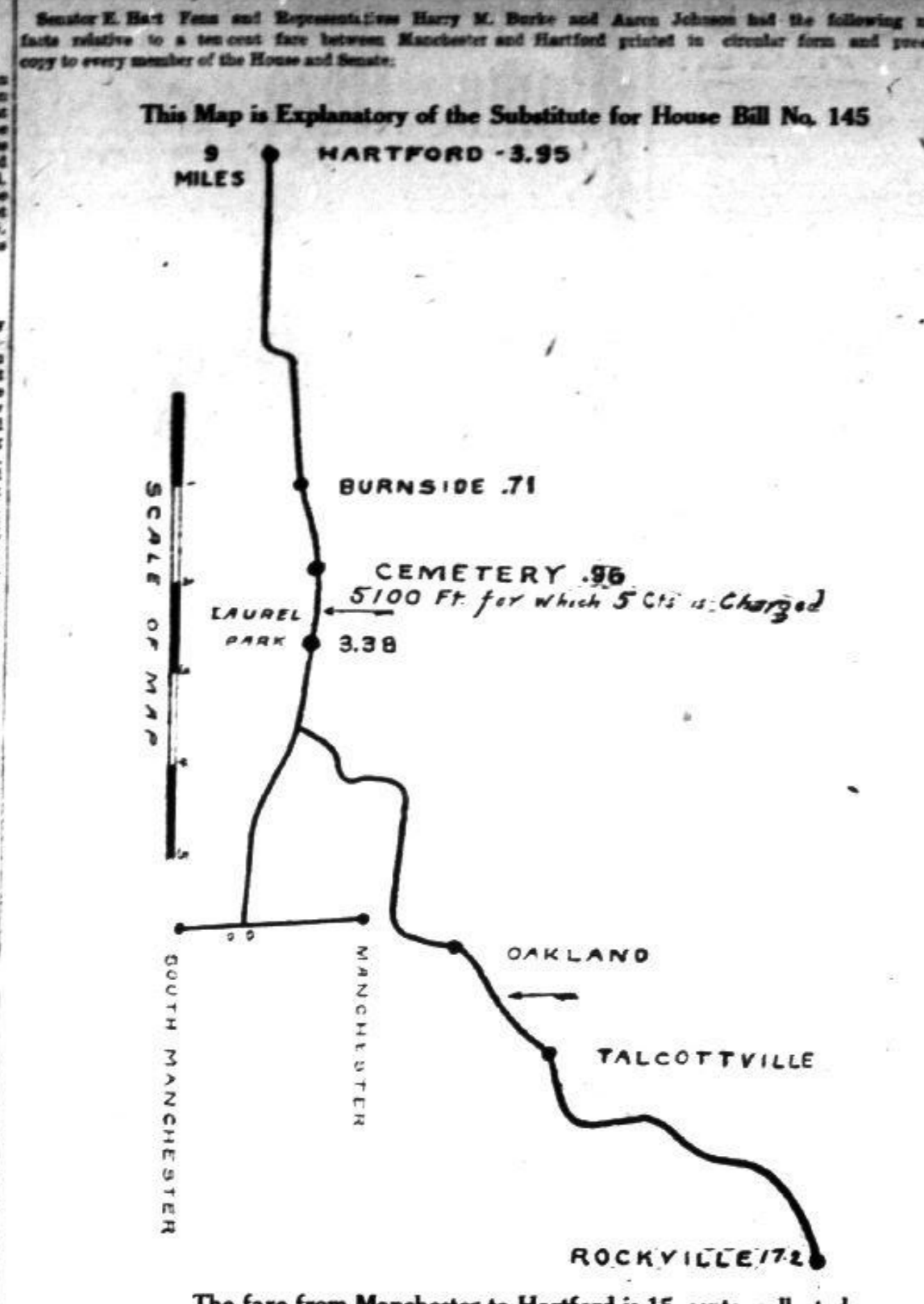
Mr. and Mrs. Albro have a girl and one boy remaining. Calah is the younger of the two, and within one of the youngest of the family.

The trolley line formerly belonged to two companies, namely the Hartford, Manchester & Rockville Trolley Company and the Hartford & Rockville Trolley Company. Both companies at Burnside, these two lines are now under the name of the Connecticut Company and are controlled by the N. Y. N. H. & Hartford R. R. Co.

No person shall be required to pay a fare greater than five cents for transportation upon the trolley cars of the Connecticut Company, anywhere within the limits of the town of Manchester, at the terminus of the line of said Connecticut Company at City Hall in the City of Hartford, and at all transfer points along the lines of the Connecticut Company, between the town of Manchester and the City of Hartford, without any charge being made therefor.
