AFTER THE BATTLE.

An incident that seemed to explain Joshua's Miracles. There was an incident in our life at Brandy, connected with Gettysburg, which is worth relating. The soldier, whose map of the battlefield of Gettysburg is authority and whom we had fallen in with while we were there, asked to join our men at Brandy when he came to the army to verify the positions of the various commands. One night we had just set down to dinner when he entered our big hospital tent, quite tired.

"Well," he announced after taking his place at the table, "I have been down in the Second Corps and I believe I have discovered how Joshua made the sun stand still. A MONSTER SKULL.

One That Was Said to Be Bigger Than a Baseball. One of the most remarkable finds of gigantic human remains of which we have any record was that said to have been discovered by a farmer in the year 1516, when an entire skeleton of unheard of proportions was unearthed by some marble quarry men. These marauders remained measured exactly thirty-four feet from head to foot and nine feet seven inches from point to point of the shoulders. The stone at which the skull was found is said to be seen at Palermo in section—"Z" of the St. Isoretto museum. It is made of a bluish looking, fine grained, boulders and appears to be about two feet thick and long by one foot broad and nine inches through in the thickest place. Miss May Harriman, the eldest daughter of Edward H. Harriman, the railway magnate, has donated one of the Erie Railroad Hudson river ferryboats to a Brooklyn committee and the Brooklyn Red Cross society that are making a commendable crusade against tuberculosis. The craft went into commission early in July. The man-of-war to fight the plague is anchored in the upper bay of New York, having the statue of Liberty as a background and so placed as to receive the heading breezes that come up through the Narrows from the ocean. The boat is supplied with hammocks, steam chairs and other conveniences for the comfort of 300 men, women and children. Three meals a day are served, and there is an abundance of fresh milk and eggs given out between meals. Every article as far as possible is contributed by Miss Harriman from her father's farm at Arden. The products are the best that money can command. An open air school is one of the features of the scheme for the benefit of Brooklyn children who are kept from the public schools by reason of the disease. TRADE SCHOOL

PUBLIC MEETING TO BE HELD HERE NEXT MONDAY AFTERNOON TO CONSIDER LOCATING SUCH HERE

State Board of Education To Be at High School Assembly Hall To Hear Reasons Substantiating Local Claims on Subject. Some Reasons Why South Manchester Should Have Trade School.

A public meeting will be held at High School Assembly Hall next Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at which representatives of the State Board of Education will be present to listen to arguments that interested persons in this place may present showing why a trade school should be established here under the new law, as previously mentioned in these columns.

This matter that should interest everybody living here who is desirous of adding a very necessary branch of practical education to our present system of free public schools. The great need of having a trade school in a community of this sort should attract all who care for the matter the slightest thought.

Our schools are turning out boys and girls year after year whose principal occupation prior to following the text book is the manual work of silk, velvet, ribbons, wool, and all the branches of mechanical skill related thereto. If anything can be done that will bring us up to date as to the needs of the time, it is to have a school that will teach the fundamental principles of the textile industry, the industry at which most of our young people find occupation in this place.

It will be remembered that under the new law two-day schools are to be established in the State of Connecticut, managed by the State Board of Education and operated at the expense of the State. For these two trade schools there are already ten cities and towns making application.

Selection and location of a site for the State Board of Education why one of these schools should be located in the town of Manchester and to that end it is hoped that every person who possibly can will make it his business to attend this meeting and by his presence there show his interest and earnestness in the matter of having South Manchester selected as one of the places for a trade school.

It is desired that as many as can will prepare themselves in advance and present reasons to the representatives of the State Board of Education why South Manchester should have a trade school conducted at the state's expense. Some reasons in behalf of such selection follow.

RECOMMENDATIONS Chief Atwood recommended the purchase of about 1000 feet more of hose and said that at the burning of the House & Hale block 250 feet were destroyed.

Chief Atwood recommended placing single valves on double hydrants in order that water might be shut off from one stream without interference with the other.

Mr. Hasbrouck recommended keeping fire alarm box keys in glass front cabinet at the fire alarm boxes.

N. B. Richards suggested placing fire hydrants in the best section on the east side of the street in order to avoid difficulty as such as were experienced at the burning of the House & Hale block by having the hydrant too near the fire.

Mr. Richards also suggested moving the double hydrant farther from the bank building in order that a long-handled wrench could be used in opening the hydrant for use.

RECORDARY LEBER Chairman Cheney said that the district officers had investigated proposed changing of boundaries and advised not making them until a tax was levied and collected and the obligations of the district removed. The changes will not be made this year.

HOUSE FOR HIRE 2 Chairman Cheney explained the delay in constructing the proposed house for Hose Company No. 2 at the Center street corner of the street, securing a right of way to the building lot at the rear of the Town Hall where it was proposed to build the house. Mr. Cheney thought this matter would be adjusted very soon and that the house might be built and closed in before the coming of severe winter weather.
