FOR REGISTRAR OF VOTERS

JOHN JENSEN OF MANCHESTER GREEN IS MAKING AN ATTEMPT TO WIN MINORITY POSITION ON BOARD

He Well Known About Town and Very Popular - Hopes to Attract Support of Friends Irrespective of Party Lines - Has Many Desirable Qualities which Fit Him for Office of Registrar of Voters.

Mr. Jensen is of the opinion that he can win the bill to the entire satisfaction of the voters that he has qualifications eminently fitting him for the duties of that office. He has been in the public eye in this community for a goodly number of years and is well and popularly known about town, has many very excellent qualities of head and heart and has a large and devoted number of admiring friends whose assistance he intends to invoke in his own behalf in this attempt to secure the office of Registrar of Voters of the Town of Manchester.

Mr. Jensen enters into the contest with complete confidence in his ability to faithfully and efficiently serve the people of the entire town in the transaction of the duties of that office. He comes out openly, manfully and in a gentlemanly way to aspire to the vote of his fellow townsmen, and is making a worthy attempt to have his efforts crowned with victory.
