THE ORDER OF LARKS

NEW FRATERNITY ORGANIZED UNDER LAWS OF STATE OF CONNECTICUT. A. D. CIVIL LEGAL BIRTH.

Successor To Deceased Order of Owls Which Was Summarily Rejected and Officially Interfered Here Last Week—Meeting of New Order of Larks, Incorporated, at Foresters Hall.

A meeting of the committee of fifteen appointed for the purpose of organizing a new fraternity instead of the Order of Owls which was permanently abandoned in disgrace here last week, was held at the home of Harry M. Burke Monday evening; eleven out of the fifteen members of the committee being present, and the rest being accounted for.

The principal business of the meeting was to take preliminary steps looking to the incorporation of a new fraternity under the laws of the State of Connecticut. To this end, the committee officially adopted the name of "The Order of Larks, Incorporated."

Mr. Burke then an incorporation blank prepared to advance ready for inserting such name as the committee might adopt for the proposed new fraternity, together with the other necessary data, as by law required. All of the members of the committee present signed the articles of incorporation, Mr. Burke acting as Notary Public and administering the necessary oath. The signers of the articles of incorporation are as follows: Herman E. Monte, John M. Pfeiffer, John H. Bissell, Carl J. Anderson, W. J. Flood, Samuel Hand, Oscar Peterson, Alexis Tourant, John Bantley and Patrick H. Dougherty. Harry M. Burke signing as notary public.

Mr. Burke was authorized to carry the articles of incorporation to the Secretary of State at the Capitol in Hartford on the following day, take the necessary measures and pay the necessary fee for having the proposed new fraternity incorporated under the laws of the State of Connecticut—which he did.

It was also voted to call the first meeting of The Order of Larks, Incorporated to be held at Foresters hall tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock. At this meeting the articles of incorporation will be officially accepted, members will be enrolled and the new fraternity officers will be chosen and other important business transacted.

The committee will present a report of progress in the matter of preparing a constitution and by-laws for the government of The Order of Larks, Incorporated and will endeavor to have in readiness the most essential features of same in order that the work of the new fraternity may go on.

It is intended that those who have their applications for membership in the works will be acted upon and admitted to The Order of Larks. There are a number of such applications now in hand and it is intended to make arrangements to that those persons who are waiting for admission will be taken care of at the meeting tomorrow evening, and an effort will be made to arrange all the preliminaries with this end in view.

Notifications by postal card have been sent to all local persons who were admitted to membership in the defunct Order of Owls here.

It is understood that The Order of Larks, Incorporated is the successor of the erstwhile Order of Owls, which died a-borning in this place and was interred without ritualistic ceremony at the meeting held in Foresters Hall last week Wednesday.

The articles of incorporation of The Order of Larks have been legally filed with the secretary of state at Hartford, and with the Town Clerk at Manchester.

It has been decided to call the local branch of The Order of Larks, Incorporated "Pope No. 1." Should other "Pope" of the order be organized, either here or elsewhere, they will be given the proper "Moose Number" in order of their application for membership.

In due course of time a suitable ritual will be prepared here which will set forth the principles and purposes of the new order and will comprise necessary secret work, etc.

A tentative constitution will be presented tomorrow evening for the consideration of the meeting. This will include essential features which will be the order to legally transact its business and will be subject to such action as the meeting may see fit to take thereon.

The several articles of the proposed constitution will be presented to the meeting tomorrow evening in the form of votes, and will be subject to such action as the meeting may see fit to take thereon.

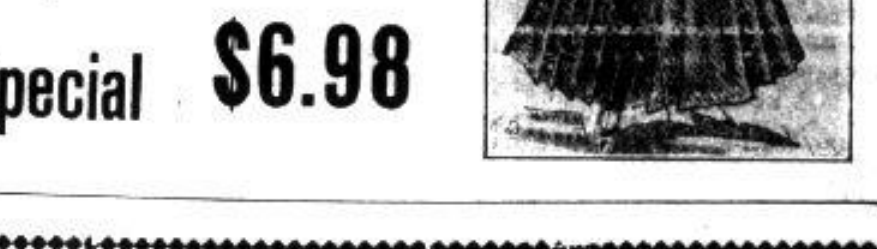
