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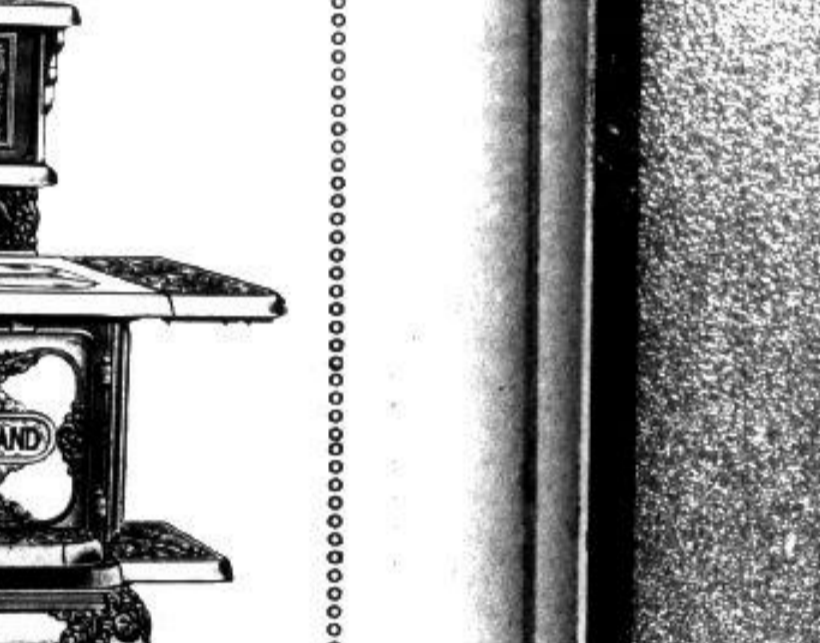

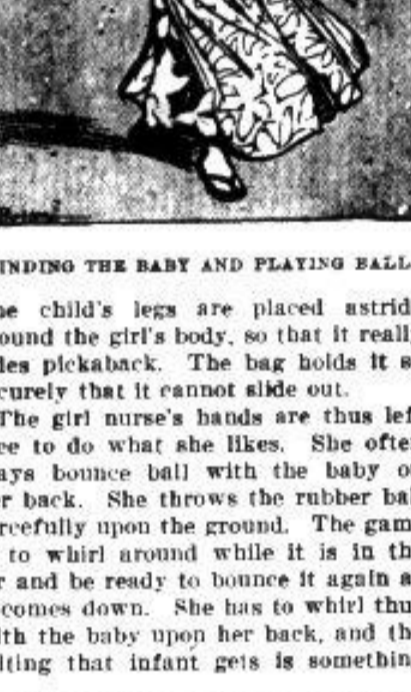

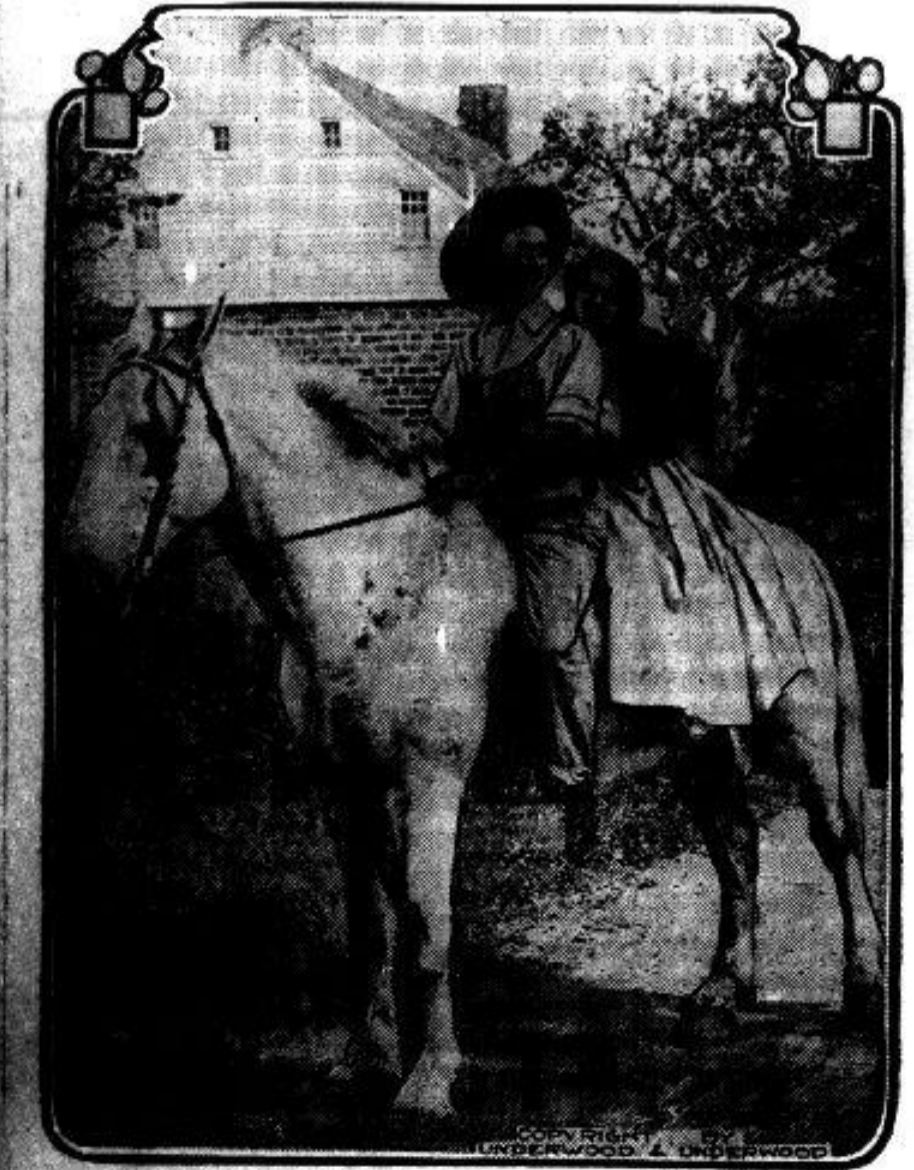

WANT PUBLIC BUILDING

At the meeting of the Manchester Business Men's Association held last evening E. L. G. Hohenbush introduced the following resolution, which was passed:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby instructed to correspond with the Hon. Morgan G. Bulkeley, U. S. Senator, and the Hon. E. Stevens Henry, Representative in Congress for this district requesting both of them to have introduced in the respective branches of Congress a bill for the purchase of a site and the erection of a building thereon by the United States Government in the Town of Manchester, Conn.

EXTEND CARRIER SERVICE

Mr. Hohenbush introduced the following: Resolved, That the secretary be and hereby is directed to have prepared a proper form of petition to the Post Office Department at Washington, requesting the extension of the carrier delivery service to that section of the town known as Manchester, but in such a way as to retrace the post office line located at Manchester, and that the petition be sent to the Representative in Congress for his District, Hon. E. Stevens Henry and that he be requested to give it his endorsement and after presenting it to the proper authorities to do all in his power to secure this service.

Resolved, That a sufficient number of these forms be drawn and placed in the hands of as many as will circulate them for signatures, and that these forms be gotten out at once and when filled that they be brought back to the office and sent to Mr. Henry not later than March 15th, 1910.

The following amendment to above was passed: Resolved, That above be left to a committee consisting of W. E. Hibbard, A. L. Brown, E. T. Ferris, to get the sentiment of the North End people and report same to a future meeting of the association.

Horace H. Cheney offered the following, which was passed: Voted, That the officers secure some speaker for each meeting of the association.

REGISTRATION OF TOWN BONDS. Selectman Horace H. Cheney spoke upon registration of town bonds and heartily commended a same. This subject is to be acted upon at the next annual town meeting. By having town bonds registered a lower rate of interest can be secured and the town's credit greatly strengthened. The cost of registration is \$60, but will save the town \$100 over cost annually.

WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY

Next Tuesday will be Washington's Birthday and a legal holiday. On account of the holiday occurring on Tuesday the agreement regarding holiday closing of the stores exempts owners from observing the usual holiday closing hours, viz. at 1 p. m. as the general custom. The printed schedule sets forth that if Decoration Day, Labor Day, New Year's Day or Washington's Birthday occur on Tuesday or Saturday the holiday closing hours do not apply. It will be well for the public generally to keep this fact in mind and to remember that any of their wants can be attended to at the stores on Washington's Birthday the same as if there were no legal holiday.

It will also be well to bear in mind the fact that the banks will be closed all day next Tuesday. It so happened last year that the banks were closed on Tuesday, which was a legal holiday, that the banks were closed all day, and as a result many people were disappointed when going to the bank to transact business, as they found that the doors were secured and that there could be no banking business done until the Monday following. Oversight in this matter sometimes works considerable annoyances where persons are not prepared to meet emergencies as they arise.

A RARE COIN.

It is called a "mistake" and is very seldom seen.

Sound waves and the way they act upon the ears. The direction of a sound by the sense of hearing is like the rapid focusing of an eye on objects at different distances, one of those instinctive operations which are continually done without any conscious method.

Sound waves traverse the air as ripples on the water, and the ear by experience acquires some slight power of detecting the direction in one case, as in the case of the bat, which can follow the eye of a dog with far greater accuracy in the other. Usually we unconsciously receive assistance from other senses as well. Often we fail to locate at once some familiar sound, but we know that it must be directly facing or turned from the source of sound, and our previous rough idea of its whereabouts generally prompts us to face it.

Wind and Temper. There is loose connection between wind and temper than at first sight appears. A coldish wind has a bracing effect and, on the contrary, in a country where hot winds occur periodically, on the other hand, these are regarded as a nuisance, if not a curse.

Every one almost gets cold, weary and done up and has a headache daily. In Egypt the season when summer is commonest is when the hot winds blow. Scarcely always during a severe sirocco the Arabs in Algeria were restless, if they did not attempt to act madly, rising the sedans, which now and then rush across the Mediterranean in very blasts from Africa, swept every one in Spain and Italy, but here in our country. And even in the Port of the Antilles the fierce hot wind is such a pest that it is recorded of a family living in Havana that they made it a rule in the household to preserve absolute silence until the wind disappeared.

FOR FEDERAL BUILDING

In response to action taken by the Manchester Business Men's Association at their meeting last week Thursday, Congressman E. Stevens Henry of the First District introduced a resolution in Congress Wednesday asking for the appropriation of \$25,000 for the erection of a federal building in this town.

It will be remembered that, on motion of E. L. G. Hohenbush, it was voted by the Manchester Business Men's Association to petition our congressman to do all in his power in order that we might have such a building. Secretary F. W. Mills corresponded with Mr. Henry and the latter took the proposition up at once and introduced the measure, as noted above. For this promptness in taking cognizance of the desires of his constituents Congressman Henry is to be commended. It is trusted that he will make an aggressive campaign in this matter and push it to a finish. The mere introduction of the bill without earnest, well directed and energetic efforts upon the part of our constituents will be unavailing. Manchester voters have always stood loyally by Congressman Henry and never a case before them farther offshore has always been so ready, also a willing to take up a 25c K. position matter. Mr. Henry has found Republican voters here in abundance who were willing to swell the ranks on the winning side of the balance sheet.

On the theory that one road through the voters of Manchester is to have a good politician, Mr. Henry will make his ability to make good and to carry out the wishes of his constituents in this matter. They have not burdened him with petitions of any sort heretofore. Now that they have made an appeal they expect that practical results will be forthcoming and that the federal building for Manchester will, within a reasonable period of time, become a reality.

PROHIBITION ACTIVITIES

The Prohibitionists are active at work in Hartford preparing for the spring elections when they propose to bring the question of license or no license before the voters of the Capital City. Under the new law which calls for signatures of ten per cent. of the entire voting population of any community before a vote may be taken on the question of license or no license, the Prohibitionists are already at work securing names for this purpose. They held a meeting in Hartford last week at which this matter was discussed as well as matters pertaining to prohibition generally and they secured eight hundred of the required signatures required for this purpose. E. L. G. Hohenbush of this place in speaking at the meeting urged the Hartford Prohibitionists to place a full Prohibition ticket in nomination at the coming municipal election in Hartford.
