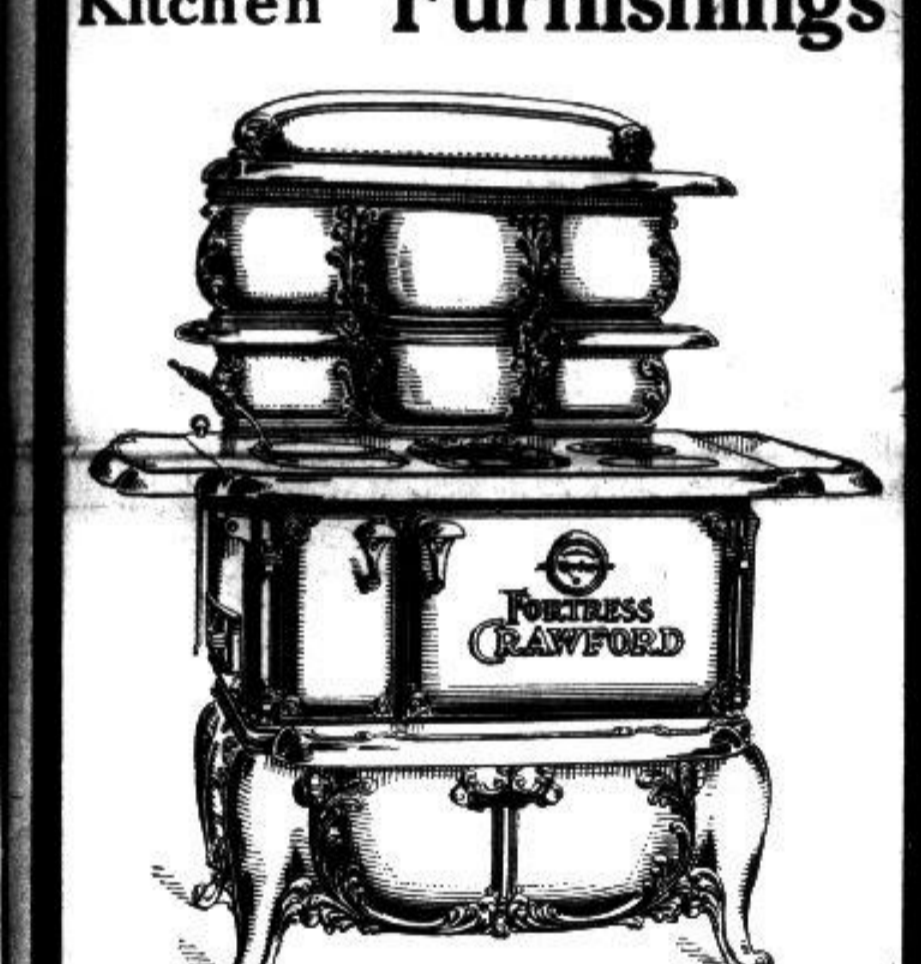

RAID AND FOG

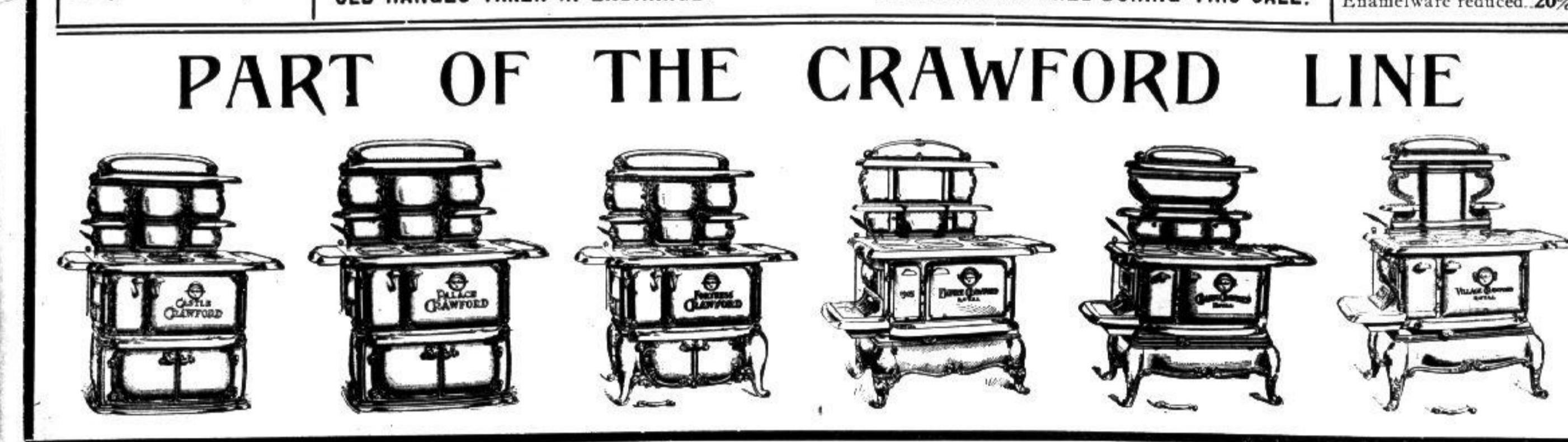
