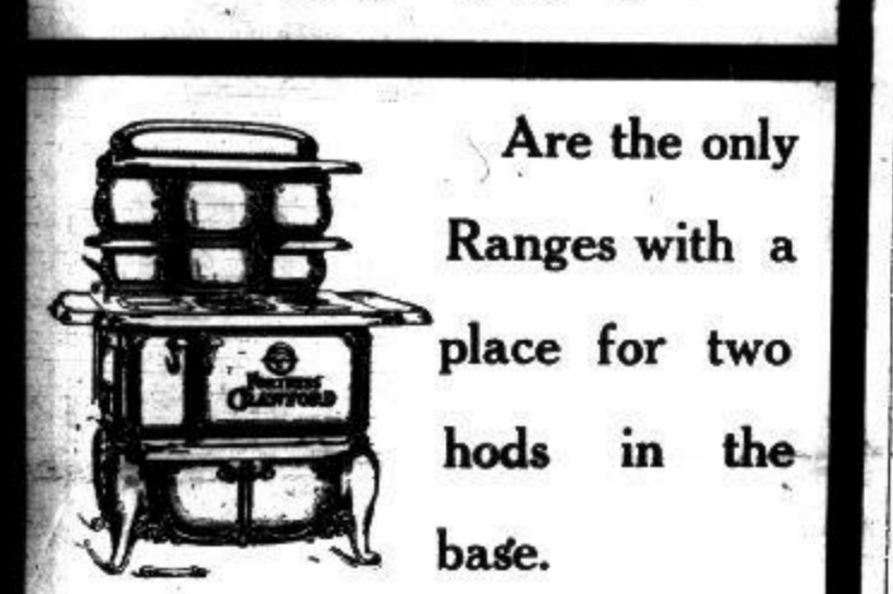

TO VOTERS

LAST WORD AS TO DICEDT PRIMARY WHICH WILL BE NEXT TUESDAY

Care Must Be Taken Not To Vote For More Candidates Than Allowed By Law. Contests Only on Selections, Assessors, Constables & Representatives

We desire once more to direct the attention of our readers and the public generally to the importance of the Direct Primary which will take place at the Town Hall next Tuesday.

The polls will be open from eight o'clock in the morning until eight in the evening.

Ballots will be prepared for each of the primaries as a regular occurrence. These may be obtained from the ballot distribution table the night next to a day.

Persons desiring to make any arrangements with the ballot may do so with a lead pencil or pen, whichever is at hand, and if your party ballot does not contain the name of a candidate for whom you wish to vote, you have the privilege of writing the name in on the ballot.

Be sure to mark an X behind the name of the candidate or candidates for whom you wish to vote.

It will be remembered that the officers for which more than the requisite number of names will appear on the ballot are: relief, constables and representatives.

Should you by any mistake vote for more than the legal number, you will render your ballot void and will lose your vote for the particular candidate or candidates into which you voted.

Under the heading Primary Nominations appearing at the top of column on page five of this paper, you will find the official list prepared by the Town Clerk showing the candidates to be voted upon for the several offices.

Voters enrolled on the enrollment lists of the Republican and Democratic parties only are entitled to vote at the Direct Primary.

You can only vote the ticket of the party with which you are enrolled.

Get your party ticket and enter the voting booth. Make a cross X in the square opposite each name for which you wish to vote.

Be careful you do not vote for more names than are allowed. You are entitled to vote for the following officers, you may vote for a smaller number; only one man for you wish. If you vote for more names than you are entitled to, your vote for that office will not count. For instance: If you vote for six Selectmen, your vote for Selectmen will not be counted. Vote for:

- 5 Selectmen, 2 Board of Relief, 1 Collector of Taxes, 1 Auditor, 1 Assessor, 1 School Visitor, 1 Registrar of Voters, 1 Tree Warden, 4 Constables, 2 Directors of Public Library, 3 Grand Jurors, 1 Judge of Probate, 1 Agent Town Deposit Fund, 2 Representatives of the Peace.

After marking and sealing your ballot proceed to the ballot box and deposit your vote in the box marked with the name of your party.

We would again urge voters to vote on this list of the newspaper and bring it with them to the Direct Primary next Tuesday.

NEW BALLOT

TO BE USED AT ANNUAL MEETING FOR FIRST TIME

Some Important Explanations of Law Governing Same. Every Voter Should Familiarize Himself With Legal Requirements for Voting.

In general it can be said that the ballot will contain all the names of all the candidates of all political parties, arranged in parallel columns, with the party that cast the highest number of votes at the last election for governor occupying the first column. There will be a blank column in which a voter can write the name of a candidate for any office not on the ticket and on each name on the ticket and on the left of it in the same space looking across the page, an enclosed space in which the placing of a cross registers a vote for that name. If the voter wishes to vote the ticket straight he places the cross in a space at the head of the column, which contains the party name.

Each voter is allowed three minutes in the booth which is prepared for the purpose, to prepare his vote and then he passes out the enclosure where is the ballot box and with his ballot carefully folded tears off the stub which is handed to the moderator, and the vote is sent to the box.

At the time for the annual town election draws night it may not be amiss to try to obtain direct attention of our readers to some of the details of the new form of ballot to be used on that occasion and to furnish some information on the subject, which will behoove every voter to familiarize himself.

Provision was made by the last general assembly for the use of a new form of ballot. This ballot will be held the first Monday in October, which this year will be October 3, will use these ballots in use for the first time in Connecticut.

All counties must be held at least three weeks before election as the chairman and clerk of the caucus must be the secretary of state at least eight days before election a certified list of all candidates to be voted for, and the secretary of state prepares all ballots and sends them to the proper authorities in town and cities at least six days before election, not counting Sundays. The number of official ballots to be held in each town shall be equal to all the names on the registry list and twenty per cent additional.

At least one week before election the secretary of state shall send to the clerk of the town, city or borough or other proper authority a number of sample ballots equal to twenty-five per cent of the total registration, and they are to be printed on pink paper and will be for general distribution. Any party or man can secure these sample ballots by paying the actual cost of printing and preparing the same in order to become familiar with them.

The ballot boxes in all towns in the state must be closed at any election at 6 o'clock in the afternoon, and may be closed earlier by vote of the town, city or borough. The time of opening them in the morning is left optional with the municipal authorities. If some question is to be voted on the names of candidates it should be printed on the ballot and provision is made for casting a yes or no vote on the matter in hand.

The attorney general has decided that this latter provision does not apply to the vote on the license question, and that there will have to be a separate ballot on this question. Officers election officials are allowed in and about the polling place and this will do away entirely with the horde of ticket peddlers that have made the life of a candidate miserable. A stiff penalty is provided for anyone not an election official being found with one of the official ballots in his possession. The penalty is a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$1,000 and imprisonment for not more than two years on both counts.

The act provides that if the voter marks his ballot wrongly or in any manner defaces it, he can return it to the moderator and receive a new one. There are some of the provisions of the new ballot which will be of great interest for distribution it will be well to secure one of the samples and acquaint themselves with the marking.

ROYAL ACCOUNTS.

CORE OF THE EARTH.

AN ORIENTAL GARDEN.

It is Not Planted With Flowers, and It Has No Lawns.

I know of an oriental garden in Persia where the carpeted floors come in the cool of the evening to sit and listen to ancient stories that they know by heart, or to music that was old when the pyramids were new, or perhaps to look at a dancing girl or two taking soft steps while they smoke their nargiles, yet that garden is nothing more than a series of arched subholding walls beyond walls, toned a faint, mysterious yellow that is not yellow, but white, and yet not white, but rose. In the middle is a pool of water in a rectangular basin that looks blue because of the intense sky overhead and that shimmers with gold in reflections from the walls. In the corner stands a mighty jar full of strange scarlet blossoms, and rugs of deep color and intricate patterns lie on the sun warmed flags. There is always the faint music of dripping water, and wonderful shadows move among the arches.

FIGHTING FATIGUE.

Jacking Up the Tired System Without Using Stimulants.

Efforts to keep at work are continued in spite of fatigue the quality of the work is poor and the exhaustion inordinate. Students constantly make this error and do all sorts of things to keep awake to burn the midnight oil when they would go to bed and rest they could accomplish far more in half the time in the morning with little or no fatigue.

Yet there are times when sleepiness and fatigue must be overcome without resort to stimulants which injure the judgment. The tired physician with a critical case, the student with his wits about him, and it will aid him rationally to go to an open window every fifteen or thirty minutes to take a dose of fresh air, and to breathe the cool air. His exhaustion in the end will be great, but he can make it up later.

As a matter of fact, surgeons and others whose work requires the keenest perceptions instinctively choose the early morning for their best efforts, reserving the afternoon for "low pressure" tasks or recreation. That is, it is far better to so live that we do not need the stimulus of these extraordinary methods of respiration.—American Medicine.

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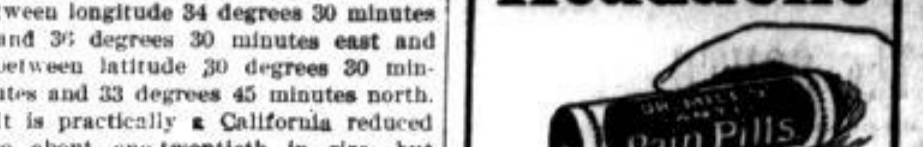
