





The association went

on record as endorsing Mr. Johnson's efforts in this important matter. Mr. Johnson had an exhibit of pack ages of various sorts containing meats. cereals, biscuits, olives, coffee, etc. Some of these had the net weight of food contained printed upon the label. The others did not have any printed information whatsoever regarding the

It was a'so pointed out by Mr. John son that in several instances packages! of similar foods put up by competing manufacturers were smaller in size and contained less food than others-but retailed at the same price as the larger packages with the full weight as printed upon the label. In supposedly onepound packages there was a shortage of four ounces avoirdupois in weight

in some instances. Mr. Jonnson took care to explain the fact that not all food packers resorted to this pernictous practice of receiving the public who purchase their products. several packers be not made public at
