Died This Morning

James E. O'Brien, proprietor of the Waranoke Inn died of Bright's disease and other complications at a private hospital in Hartford about two o'clock this morning. A solemn requiem high mass for the repose of his soul will be sung at St. James church Monday morning at 9 o'clock. Burial will be at St. Bridget's cemetery.

Mr. O'Brien was a native of County Kerry, Ireland, was in his forty ninth year. His parents came from Ireland in 1864 and settled in Wapping where they remained for five years. They removed to Ellington and for a period of 15 years were located there. The latter established his home in Bolton. Mr. O'Brien bought the Orford Inn 14 years ago and operated it for 7 years when he sold it to W. C. Tucker. Soon after he had bought the Waranoke Inn which he sold to the late Michael Boyle 5 years ago. Mr. Boyle lived but about 2 years after becoming proprietor of the Waranoke and some two years ago Mr. O'Brien again secured control of the property which he held up to the date of his death.

Besides his widow he leaves his mother, one brother, Timothy and one sister, Mrs. Mary McKinnon, all of this place.

Mr. O'Brien went to Florida one year ago today and since that time his health has been steadily declining. He has been under treatment during practically all of that period. He was recently moved to a private hospital in Hartford last Monday. While it was known that he was feeble it was not thought that the end was so near. During his illness the Waranoke Inn been capably and successfully managed by his good wife, who has developed considerable executive ability in that line of work.

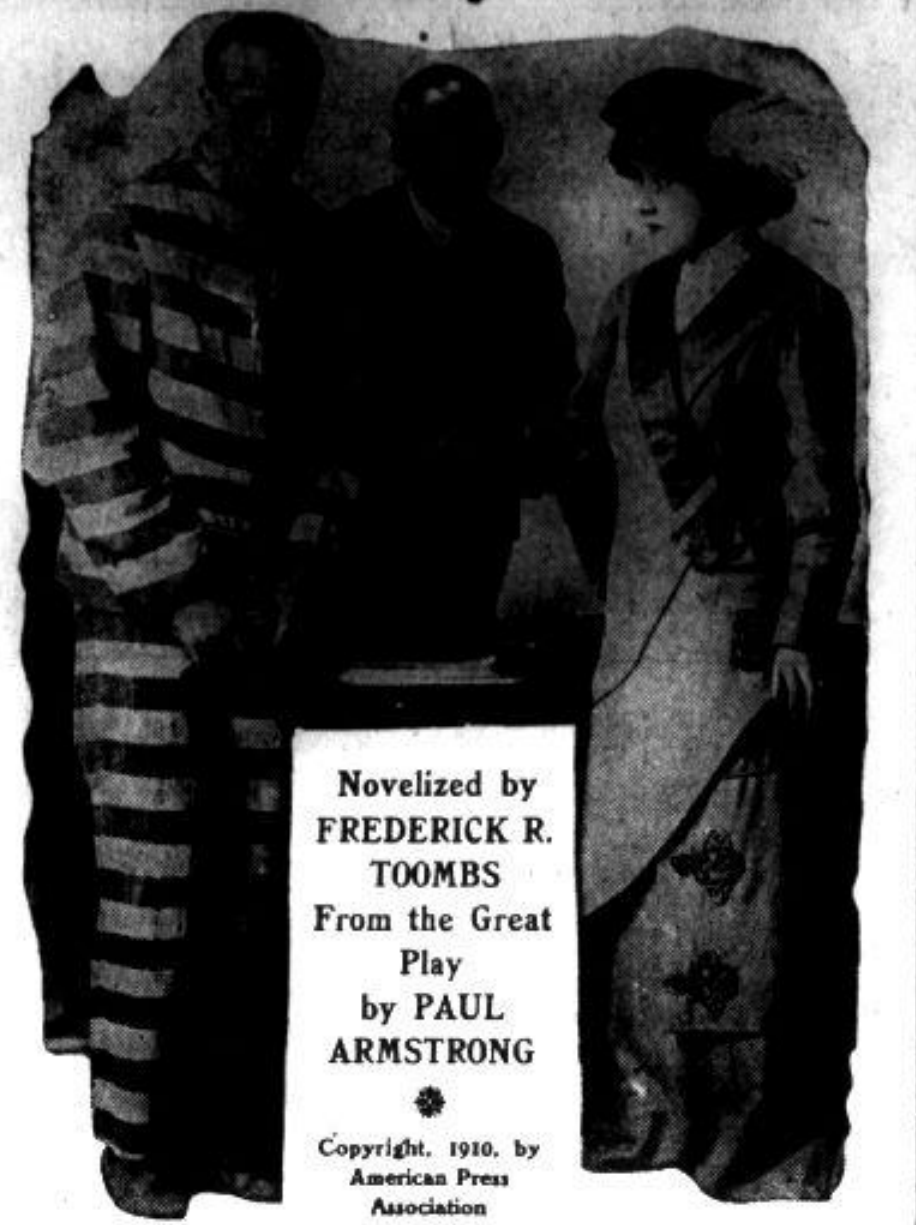
