OPEN AIR

SCHOOL AN ASSURED FACT. OPENED WEDNESDAY WITH 16 PUPILS

Ample Accommodations for Twenty Pupils. Platform and Tent Used. Warm Clothing Furnished. Good Dinner Provided Daily.

The open air school was opened Wednesday morning on the Tiffany house-stead. Main street, with sixteen pupils in attendance. It is intended to accommodate 26. Miss Aris A. Tarrant, who has been teaching in the Cooper Hill school for some years past is in charge of the school.

A platform has been constructed which raised the floor some three feet above the ground. This is covered with a large heavy tent with open flaps at the sides over the heads of the pupils when needed. Desks and chairs for 21 pupils are in the tent and a chair for the teacher. A large blackboard is part of the equipment. A platform is built at the southwest corner of the tent. This is not covered and is reached by three steps. The platform leads to the tent entrance. The part of the tent fronting the street is closed. A small stove is placed at the east end of the sickle where a coal fire is made in the morning to dry out the tent. The fire is established in a hole which is renewed during the day. The pupils will be permitted to exercise on the outer platform when deemed necessary and also take a period of sunbath from time to time.

Each pupil is assigned a heavy canvas bag warmly lined with heavy woolen blanketing. The bag practically encloses all of the body, including the feet. Warm woolen sweaters and woolen caps and mittens are included in the outfit, as are also rubber shoes for them and the children are supplied with warm wearing apparel, each piece of which is numbered. The clothing is kept in the Tiffany house-stead on the first floor front, when not in use. This room is used as a dressing room. Each outfit has its own place on the clothes rack.

In wet or stormy weather when the pupils reach the school with their clothing wet, extra dry clothing is in waiting for them and they change into it before they enter the large outer bag. The two middle rooms on the ground floor of the Tiffany house-stead are used as living rooms. There are large tables covered with white oil cloth are placed at noon the pupils are given a hot and good dinner of plain, wholesome, substantial food. A large range is placed in the kitchen where no cooking cooking utensils are at hand for the work of the cook. A nice large pantry at the east end of the kitchen completes the arrangements on the first floor.

The cooking and serving of the dinners are done under the supervision of Mrs. E. G. O'Brien, matron of Teachers Hall, next adjoining the school. Each pupil has a separate and distinct set of warm wearing apparel, each piece of which is numbered. The clothing is kept in the Tiffany house-stead on the first floor front, when not in use. This room is used as a dressing room. Each outfit has its own place on the clothes rack.

The regular school hours are observed by the open air school, namely from 8.30 to 11.30 a. m. and from 1.30 to 3.30 p. m. The recreation periods are dinner and the nap are included in the period between 11.30 a. m. and 1.30 p. m.

The pupils are not permitted to take away from the school any of the apparel or other appearances used there. Board walks are placed from Teachers Hall to the Tiffany building and from thence to the open air school. The plans for the open air school have been carried out with much care and detail and everything possible is being done for the well being of the pupils. Superintendent F. A. Verplanck has general supervision of the open air school and will see to it that the exercises are conducted in a manner so as to produce the best possible results from the experiment here.

TAX LAID

AT ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING LAST NIGHT

Moonlight Schedule of Street Lighting Abandoned—Street Lights Every Night Now—Another Garment of City Wearing Appared.

At the adjourned annual town meeting held at the Town hall last evening a tax of eight mills was laid upon the tax list of 1911.

At the special town meeting held last evening at the same place the moonlight schedule of street lighting was abandoned and it was voted to have the streets lighted every night until midnight, as at present. The sum of \$2,300 was appropriated for this purpose.

The selectmen were authorized to compensate persons held in quarantine and to be kept away from their employment and it was stipulated that the persons so compensated be not listed in the annual town report as town charges.

Several minor matters were voted at the special town meeting but the above were the items that held the interest of the general public most and for which purpose the voters crowded every available space in the hall and swam on the stairsways. Many who wanted to attend couldn't get into the hall and after vainly trying several times to get in.

Representative William S. Hyde called the adjourned annual town meeting to order and suggested a resolution so that the special town meeting might be in order. It was voted, Mr. Hyde was chosen as chairman of the special town meeting.

It was voted that the town transfer by quit claim deed to The Holl Realty Company a tract of land 50 feet wide running north and south, which land was decided to the town in 1887 for highway purposes by Catherine M. Brown through her executrix Urrum Keeney. The tract was recently purchased by E. J. Hall, Selectman H. B. Cheney and Attorney Alexander Arnott explained the matter. There was no opposition.

The matter relating to the North West cemetery was indefinitely postponed. It was opposed by John M. Williams as administrator of the J. B. Barron estate from which it was proposed to purchase eight acres of land for an additional 100 burials. Mr. Williams wanted \$200 an acre and the cemetery committee were willing to pay but \$100 an acre.

It was voted that all town meetings hereafter be held in the Town Hall. This was done at the suggestion of Boston bank officials in order to more fully secure legally in the proceedings. The establishing of legal signposts was tabled as it was found this could only be done at an annual town meeting and must appear in the warrant for said meeting.

It was voted to have the secretary of the board of selectmen post all notices of town meetings on the public sign posts, to publish each in a paper or papers having a circulation in the town and to make an attested return of such action to the Town Clerk on or before the dates of such meetings.

It was voted after some discussion to abolish the moonlight schedule of street lighting and to have the streets lighted every night until midnight as at present. The sum of \$2,300 additional was appropriated for this purpose. The board of selectmen favored this plan but were opposed to any other extension of the street lighting service at present.

The meeting by vote refused to grant extension of the street lighting service along Middle Turnpike to the Town boundary on the east.

After some discussion and explanation it was voted to compensate persons held in quarantine and to be kept away from their employment and to fix the amount of such compensation. The names of all such persons are to be omitted from the annual town reports.

Records of all such cases are kept by the town officials and records of compensation to persons quarantined will also be kept but neither will be made public.

Selectman Cheney was authorized to execute a lease with the N. Y. N. H. & H. R. R. for land on Depot square for improvements. The town will pay a nominal sum of \$100 a year for the lease. This agreement is revocable when the town's convenience requires that it be revoked.

The sum of \$500 has been appropriated for beautifying Depot square and the Manchester Improvement Society have entered more than \$1000 for this purpose. This action by the special town in relation removes the last barrier and now the beautifying of Depot square may go merrily on.

At this juncture the special town meeting was adjourned and the adjourned annual town meeting was declared to be in session.

The only question to come before this meeting was the laying of a tax and eight mills was finally voted as a compromise.

The selectmen wanted to have a nine mill tax laid. The extremists urged a reduction of the five percent discount on the payment of the taxes was sought to get through by Attorney H. M. Barke.

There was deep interest felt in this question and at one juncture an amendment naming seven mills was actually voted. A mixup among the parliamentarians caused favoring seven mills. The motion prevailed and Mr. Foley immediately moved that the original motion for a nine mill tax as presented by Selectman Cheney be amended by striking out the word nine and inserting the word eight and this was carried with a rush. The motion as amended was then put by Chairman Hyde and finally carried, after being doubted by advocates of a nine mill tax.

The meeting was adjourned at 9.30 o'clock. All breathed a sigh of relief and it was felt generally that, all things considered, a happy solution of the tax problem had been reached.
