Honored Retiring Pastor

Representative Aaron Johnson of this place had the very great satisfaction last Tuesday of leaving a favorable report from the House chairman of the legislative committee on Public Health and Safety on his net weight food bill which was passed unanimously by the House on the very hearty commendation of Chairman Thompson. Mr. Thompson declared it to be one of the most meritorious and important measures that came before the committee and heartily recommended its passage. The net weight bill is as follows: "No person shall sell or offer for sale food in package form unless the net quantity is marked on the outside of the package in terms of weight, measure, or numerical count provided, however, that reasonable variations shall be permitted, and that tolerance shall be established by rules and regulations made from time to time by the dairy and food commissioner."

The net weight bill will take effect from its passage, but no penalty of fine, imprisonment, or condemnation shall be enforced for any violation of the provisions of section 1 of this act as to products prepared prior to six months after the passage of this act.

Mr. Johnson has set his heart on the passage of this bill, has worked day and night to bring it before his fellow legislators, has given of the best that was in him in order that this very far reaching measure might be placed upon the statute books of the State of Connecticut. It is known as the Johnson bill and it is the honor of the net weight bill of the governor as it undoubtedly will, will be the means of passing Mr. Johnson's bill to posterity with credit for his success in an important measure in the interest of the common people.

Industrial Bureau

The Industrial Bureau of the New England Lines, established by order of President Mellen, began its activities on May 1. Its headquarters are at the South Station; it is in charge of Mr. W. H. Seelye, with the title of Industrial Manager for the New England Lines.

Mr. Seelye comes directly to his new post from his position as general freight and passenger agent of the Central New England Railway. That company has for the past eight years been owned by the New Haven.

Mr. Seelye, who is thus released for his new office, is young, energetic and immensely interested in the task that awaits him.

He will be his function to come into touch with all the diversified aspects of New England industrial life: manufacturing, agricultural, commercial.

He will study their peculiarities, their needs, their possibilities for growth; the various steps desirable for their expansion; for increasing the outputs, for extending their markets, for improving their methods and their products.

In all these matters Mr. Seelye will not only be assisted by a competent and well organized office staff, but will have the cooperation of local officials of the various companies in whose behalf the bureau is organized.

The Industrial Bureau of the New England Lines will thus act as a sort of clearing-house for receiving and utilizing the information that is available among the many hundreds of local agencies throughout New England.

has been the experience with the activities of industrial departments elsewhere, and it is felt that it cannot fail to hold true in the present instance.

Other instrumentalities through which the Industrial Bureau aims to work are the local boards of trade, the colleges and the technical schools, seeking their cooperation in inducing practical activities for industrial advancement.

Through the trade organizations, for instance, the bureau will keep informed as to the industrial needs and opportunities of their respective communities, and in return its own extensively collected and systematically filed data as to such matters will be placed at their disposal.

In recent years the railroads of New England have been more disposed towards positive steps for fostering local industry along their lines.

A notable instance is that of the great establishment which makes a peculiar grade of paper products at Walpole. When President Mellen's management learned that the company was dissatisfied with local facilities and was seriously considering removal to some more advantageous point outside of New England, no time was lost in effecting more favorable local conditions.

The handicrafts complained of were removed, the company was encouraged to make extensive additions to its plant, more favorable commodity rates were made, and the industry soon experienced an enormous growth.

In other ways the railroads have encouraged vast water power developments in Maine and New Hampshire. Under systematic propaganda by the Industrial Bureau such instances of industrial growth will be multiplied manifold.

The experience of the pioneer railroad industrial department, that of the Southern Railway, is instructive for New England. It was organized by Mr. M. V. Richards and was the first instance of a systematic endeavor to promote the exploitation of an extraordinarily diversified range of industrial opportunities throughout a large section of the country.

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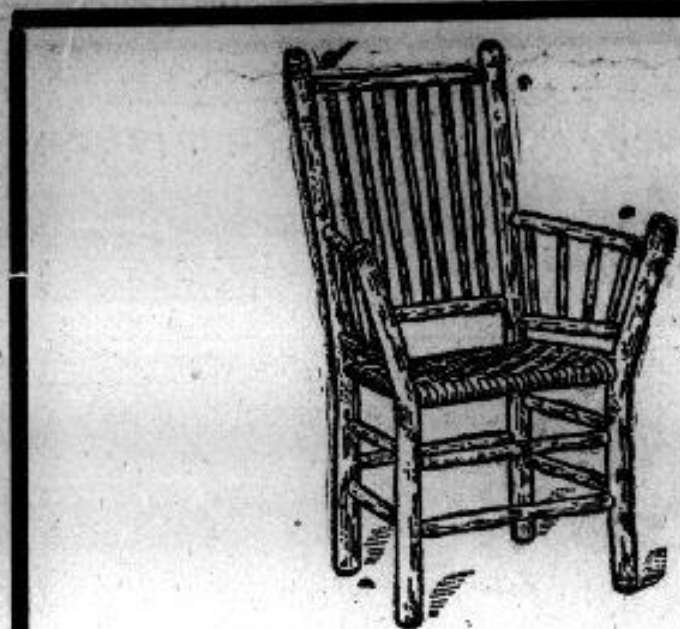

MORE WATER WORK STARTED THIS WEEK ON MAKING EXCAVATIONS Globe Hollow Reservoir To Be United With Folly Brook - Sixteen Inch Water Mains Being Laid - Pumping Station Will Serve As Escort.

The South Manchester Water Company started a gang of men at work Wednesday morning on Pine street at Cheney Hall making excavations for the laying of water main to Folly Brook. This is carrying out the plans which they have made for increasing the water supply at Globe Hollow. It is the purpose of the South Manchester Water Company to lay 16-inch water mains from the Folly Brook pond in the West part of the town over to Globe Hollow. A pumping station will be installed at the Folly Brook pond and a pump installed having a capacity of 1,000 gallons per minute. This pump will be operated by a sixty-five horse power motor or engine. The 16 inch water main will have a capacity of 1500 gallons of water a minute. There is a rise of 140 feet from the Folly Brook pond to the Globe Hollow reservoir. It will therefore be seen that considerable friction must be overcome in forcing water from the Folly Brook pond to the Globe Hollow reservoir. It is an uphill drive of the water through the mains. The water that is available from Folly Brook is practically equivalent to that existing at the present time into the Globe Hollow reservoir. It is not believed that the proposed new pumping station will have to operate continuously. It is intended however to have it ready for use at all times should such a condition be required. This accession to our water supply will be a very valuable one and will serve to meet the requirements of South Manchester for a considerable period of time.
