BILL PASSED HOUSE

Net Weight Food Package Bill To Become Law

Representative Aaron Johnson of this place has won a signal victory in the passage of his net weight food package bill through the House last Tuesday in concurrence with the Senate by accepting the amendments tacked on by that body last week.

It will be recalled that the House passed the bill first and sent it over to the Senate. The latter body accepted the House bill in full but added on some minor amendments which were not particularly displeasing to Mr. Johnson nor to the other proponents of the bill in the House and therefore were accepted.

There is opposition here at this time relative to granting the petition of the Connecticut Company for additional turnouts and sidings along the trolley line within the borders of the Town of Manchester.

The jobs are appearing to be in line. The net weight bill is certainly more in accordance with public needs in this place than is the granting of any concessions for turnouts or sidings.

UTILITIES FIGHT IN SPOT LIGHT

House of Representatives Greatly Stirred Over It

BILL IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL

Banks Offers Substitute Drawn by Development - House on Net Weight Bill Strongly Opposed, but Cannot Be Dropped - House Kills Woman Suffrage.

(Special Correspondence.) Hartford, June 14.—The talk about the corridors of the state capitol is that the present session of the general assembly is likely to exceed the record made last year, when the longest session ever ended Aug. 24.

The house has shown no disposition to hurry, and yesterday, after the senate had adjourned for lack of business for the day and with more than forty matters on its calendar to dispose of, the house held but a short session and refused to sit in the afternoon.

The most interesting matter in the house was the introduction by Judge Banks of Fairfield, the Republican house leader, of a substitute for the so-called minority bill for a public utilities commission which is believed to obviate the objections to the minority bill on constitutional grounds or to try to do this. This was tabled for printing and will be considered by the house at the same time with the rest of the bills on this subject, which are a long order of the day for tomorrow, and one which the house proposes to spend a great deal of the day for.

The house put the final touches on the Johnson net weight package bill this morning, despite the earnest efforts of Mr. Miner of New Britain, who is in the wholesale grocery business, to defeat it by means of the argument that this legislation ought to come from the federal congress instead of being enacted by state legislation. The lower branch was determined to have such legislation on the book, however, and passed it with no slight gusto, after accepting the amendments of the senate which exempt from its provisions packages of confectionery and shelled nuts selling for less than 11 cents each, and also making the superintendent of the state agricultural experiment station in New Haven the associate of the dairy and food commissioner in fixing the list of reasonable variations which the law says shall be provided.

The special title license bill which passed the senate received its quietest in the house after numerous amendments, some of which had passed the senate and some not, had been rejected. There was no more to be said to save this bill than to kill the net weight bill.

Last week, Wednesday, there were special orders in both branches, as there are on almost every day now. Probably no general assembly ever delayed the reports of its important business until as late in the session as has been the case with the present one. The senate Wednesday had as the order of the day the bill prohibiting the employment of minors under sixteen in certain hazardous occupations and also the so-called net weight bill, the Johnson bill, which has occasioned so great interest during the session.

The debate on the former measure was not very lengthy. Senator Platt of Waterbury, who is himself a manufacturer, put in an amendment which was claimed to have the effect of killing the whole bill, and this was rejected, and later the bill was passed. It prohibits the employment of children under sixteen about machinery of various kinds and in the manufacture or handling of explosives or dynamite, paints or colors and similar products, prohibits the employment of female workers at work which requires them to stand the greater part of the day and prohibits any person who has been found to have been in violation of the law from running more than 200 feet per minute.

Net Weight Bill Passed. The net weight bill requires that manufacturers of foodstuffs packed in packages shall plainly mark on the packages the net weight, measure or numerical count of the contents. Mr. Johnson of Manchester, who has spent his life in the grocery business, whole and retail, and thoroughly understands the intricacies of the whole weight and short measure package which is purchased because it is believed to be a more satisfactory method of handling foodstuffs and has worked out in detail how largely this system is responsible for the present high cost of living, has spent his session on this matter and is greatly delighted at the enactment of his measure.

The Johnson bill passed the house in the 52nd reported unanimously by the committee and covered all packages of articles meant for food consumption. The senate, however, amended it so as to exclude from its operations packages of confectionery sold at less than 11 cents each. The heaviest opposition to the measure before the committee came from a New Britain merchant who has been in the business since 1840 and who has been a member of the legislature for many years.

means of his proposing that the measure apply to loaves of bread and other articles were rejected. There were but four votes against the bill itself and twenty-five for it. Another amendment was put on by the senate which gives to the dairy and food commissioner of the state and the chief of the agricultural experiment station at New Haven the duty of fixing a list of reasonable variations which the measure calls for.

The law is not to go into effect for eighteen months, so far as it would affect goods packed previous to the enactment of it. The bill had to go back to the house because of the senate amendments, and House Chairman Thompson of the committee on public health and safety, which handled it, tried to get it through the house last Thursday, but the connection over the effort to get the public utilities legislation up previously had unsettled that body so that it was fit for nothing but adjournment just at that time. There is anticipated no difficulty in getting the house to accept the amendments, however.

House Kills Woman Suffrage. On Wednesday the house had as its order of the day the bill providing municipal suffrage for women, regardless of the property qualification, and the debate waxed long and eloquent. Nearly every man in the house who can talk on his feet or believes he can do so, has taken the floor in support of the bill, and the galleries, with every available space on the floor, were packed with women of every age and condition of advancement, hoping that the house would do the same—most of them, anyway, though possibly there were present some of the women who have filed so many petitions against this legislation.

The Rev. Mr. Bangs, member of the house from Guilford, made the main argument in favor of the bill, and Mr. Chandler of Rocky Hill was perhaps the principal speaker against it. Thursday the house got into a perfect gale over an effort to get the public utilities legislation up at once without the formality of having it go to the calendar in the usual way. The supporters of the minority bill made the effort with the idea of taking all possible advantage of the moral effect of the senate's passage of the minority bill and giving the majority bill people no chance to get at members over Sunday. It failed after a long and hot debate.

Set Public Utilities Debate. Mr. Whiton of New London took up the matter and urged immediate consideration for the rather flimsy reason that he meant to attend a college commencement this week and couldn't be on hand to speak on the subject.

Several members objected to immediate consideration, some because the lunch hour was already at hand and the debate would be apt to last into the evening and others from a spirit of fair play, which was offended by this effort to cram the minority bill down the throat of the house. While Mr. Chandler of Rocky Hill was talking in favor of the motion he was interrupted by Mr. Johnson of New Britain, who in a very forcible way objected to the presence in the hall of the house of a lawyer representing interests which, he claimed, were two years ago opposed to public utilities legislation. He termed his entrance into the hall as "sneaking in like a snake" and on the demand of a number of members who could not see where he pointed named the man as Attorney S. C. Morehouse of New Haven.

Johnson demanded that the floor be cleared, but this wasn't done even when afterward Mr. Bingham interrupted Judge Banks' statement that he favored clearing the hall of the house of all but members, senators and newspaper men at such a time to challenge him with the remark that two years ago when Banks was speaking in support of the bill, he cleared the hall under similar circumstances only on the third request. Banks said this wasn't so and proved it. He made a long speech, in which he didn't especially oppose immediate action if members were willing to stay and see the business through that day, but he did urge the unconstitutionality of the minority bill, questioned Governor Baldwin's authority on the same legal lines on which he has long since been wrong during his last year as chief justice of the supreme court, and read a letter from the Hon. Daniel Webster of the great constitutional national lawyers of the country, in which the latter declared the bill to be utterly unconstitutional and likely to be voided by the supreme court.

How King George Will Be Crowned

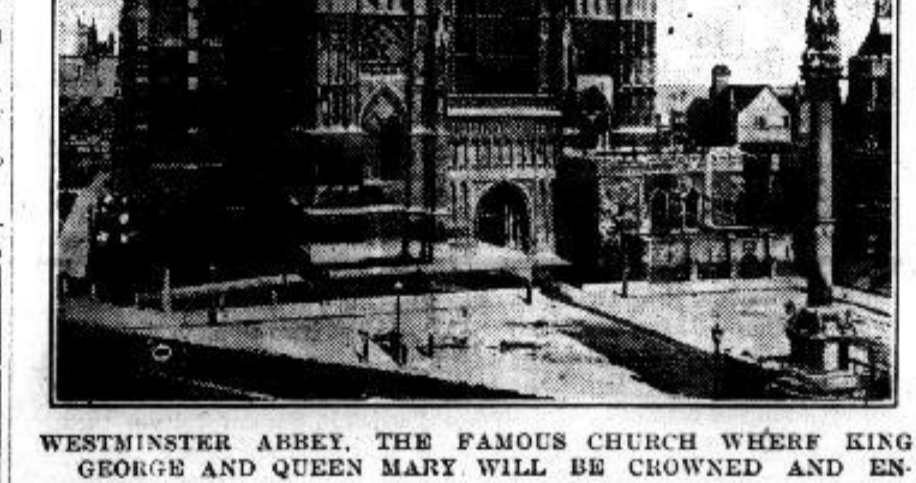
Details of the Coronation of England's New Sovereign and His Queen, June 22, in Westminster Abbey. Form and Order of the Service and the Ceremonies, Compiled From Official Sources—Solemn Rites Attending the Function—Archbishop Personally Crowns His Majesty and Queen Mary.

It would require a book—and that book has been published—to tell in detail just how King George V. and Queen Mary of England will be crowned and enthroned in Westminster Abbey on the 22d of June in the midst of a splendid gathering of princes, nobles and ecclesiastics, with as many spectators as can gain access to the great hall.

The fifth volume issued "by command of the king" gives the exact service and ceremony of the coronation. It is titled "The Form and Order of the Service That is to be Performed and of the Ceremonies That Are to Be Observed in the Coronation of Their Majesties King George V. and Queen Mary in the Abbey Church of St. Peter, Westminster, on Thursday, the Twenty-second Day of June, 1911." The length of the title indicates the duration of the ceremonies, which are long drawn out. According to the "Table of Contents" in the book, here is what takes place:

1. The preparation; 2. the entrance into the church; 3. the recognition; 4. the Litany and the beginning of the communion service; 5. the sermon; 7. the oath; 8. the anointing; 9. the presentation of the scepter and sword and the giving of the coronation oath; 10. the investiture with the sword; 11. the investiture with the scepter; 12. the putting on of the crown; 13. the presentation of the Holy Bible; 14. the benediction; 15. the enthronement of the monarch; 16. the queen's coronation; 17. the communion; 18. The Te Deum; 19. the recess.

Archbishop's Bus Day. The Rev. Randall T. Davidson, archbishop of Canterbury and as such the highest prelate in the Church of England, is a highly important personage on coronation day, for it is he who crowns the king and conducts the solemn ceremonies attendant thereto. He is assisted by the dean of West-

minster and other bishops, all of whom, it should be remembered, are peers of the realm. On coronation day the procession of bishops, headed by the archbishop of Canterbury, will form immediately outside the west door of the church and wait till notice is given of the approach of the king and queen, when they shall begin to move into the church. Their majesties are to be greeted by the singing of an anthem by the choir of Westminster. Completed and carried from the official book mentioned, the procedure of crowning and anointing King George, with many incidental details necessarily omitted, is as follows:

Presenting the King. The king and queen pass into the throne of the church, walk past their thrones and kneel at the south side of the altar, where they make brief private prayers. Then they sit down in chairs provided for them. The archbishop, the lord chancellor, the lord high treasurer and the earl marshal go in turn to each door of the church "and at every of the four sides shall in a loud voice speak to the people and the king in the manner following: 'I beseech you, that you will be content to do your homage and service, as you willing to be the same?' 'God save King George!' and repeatedly cry the people. Then the

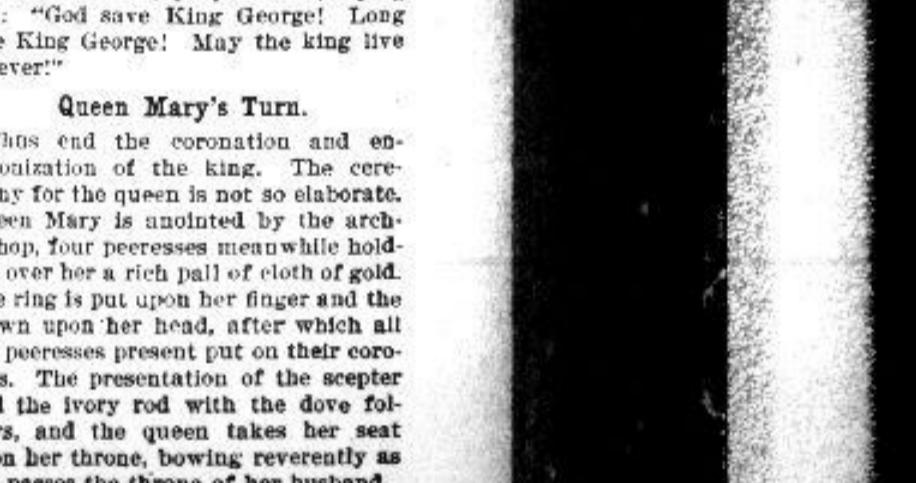
servant George our king, and as thou dost this day set a crown of pure gold upon his head (then the king must be put in mind to bow his head); so enrich his royal head with (then abundant grace and crown him with all princely virtues, through the Redeemer Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.' Then, the king sitting down in King Edward's chair, the archbishop, assisted with other bishops, shall come from the altar, the dean of Westminster shall bring the crown, and the archbishop, taking it of him, shall reverently put it upon the king's head, at the sight whereof the people, with loud and repeated shouts, shall cry: 'God save the king!' (the same shall be done for the queen, and the coronets, and the trumpets shall sound, and by a signal given the great guns at the Tower shall be shot off. The acclamation ceasing, the archbishop shall go on and say: 'God crown you with a crown of glory and righteousness, that by the ministry of this our benediction, having a right faith and manifold fruit of good works, you may obtain the crown of an everlasting kingdom by the gift of him whose kingdom endureth forever. Amen.' Then shall the choir sing: 'The strong and play the man; keep the commandments of the Lord thy God and walk in his ways.' The archbishop then takes the Holy Bible from the altar and gives it to the archbishop, who presents it

All this time the king has been uncovered, but when the sermon begins he puts on his cap of crimson velvet turned up with ermine. The sermon ended, the archbishop goes to the king and administers the communion with the queen and people standing. One of the bishops follows with a sermon, which is short, as it should be, considering the congregate length of the ceremonies.

Archbishop Will You solemnly promise and swear to govern the people of this United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Dominions thereto belonging according to the statutes in parliament agreed on and the respective laws and customs of the same. King: I will. Archbishop: Will you to the utmost of your power maintain the laws of God, the true profession of the gospel and the Protestant reformed religion established by law? And will you give to every man his right and justice in law? King: I will. Archbishop: Will you in the utmost of your power maintain the laws of God, the true profession of the gospel and the Protestant reformed religion established by law? And will you give to every man his right and justice in law? King: I will.

Now comes the enthronement, second only in interest to the actual coronation. The king is lifted into his throne by bishops and other peers, all the great nobles standing about the throne. The archbishop administers his majesty to stand firm and "establish your throne in righteousness, that it may stand fast forevermore. The king is then before him and as the faithful witness in heaven." Beginning with the archbishop, all the princes and peers kneel before the throne and vow allegiance to the sovereign, after which the archbishop kisses the left cheek of his majesty. The Prince of Wales also takes the vow of homage, and all the princes of the royal blood touch the crown on his majesty's head and kiss the king's left cheek. When the homage is ended the drums shall beat and the trumpets sound and all the people shout, crying out: "God save King George! Long live King George! May the king live forever!" Queen Mary's Turn.

This end the coronation and enthronement of the king. The ceremony for the queen is not so elaborate. Queen Mary is anointed by the archbishop, four peeresses meanwhile holding over her a rich pall of cloth of gold. The ring is put upon her finger and the crown upon her head, after which all the peeresses present put on their coronets. The presentation of the scepter and the ivory rod with the dove follows, and the queen takes her seat upon her throne, bowing reverently as she passes the throne of her husband. After commencing the king descends from his throne and, wearing the crown and carrying the scepter and rod, goes into St. Edward's chapel, followed by a great procession of bishops, peers

and princes. The queen follows, and they proceed in state into the chapel, where his majesty is relieved of the royal robe of state and reclothed in his robe of purple velvet. Their majesties proceed to the west door of the church, where they entered, all the peers following, wearing their coronets.

Now comes the climax moment of the ceremonies. Standing before the altar, the archbishop takes the crown in his hands and, laying it back upon the altar, says: "This being taken from the official book mentioned: 'O God, the crown of the faithful, bless we beseech thee, and sanctify this thy
