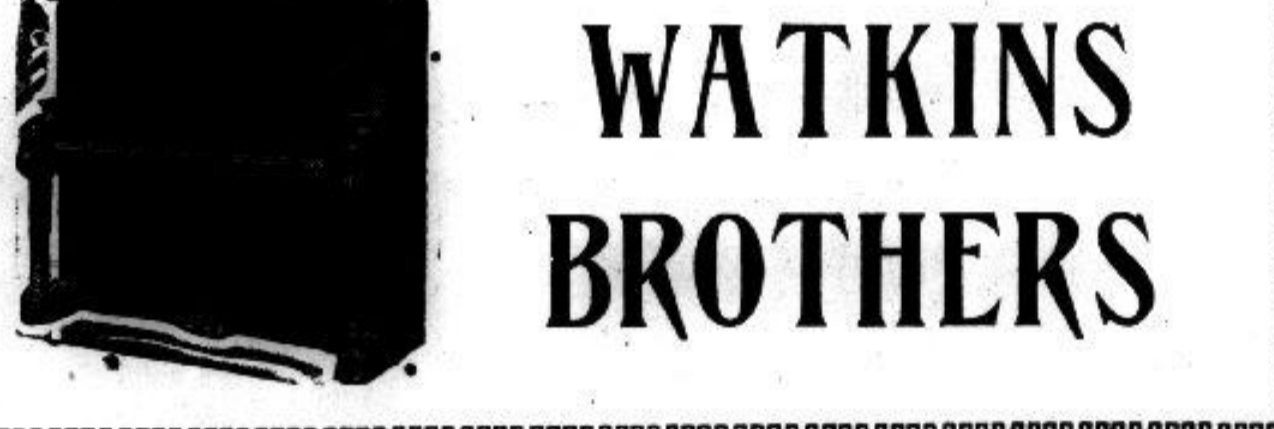

Local Bill Rejected in the House Wednesday. The bill for a ten-cent trolley fare from Manchester to Hartford was put in cold storage last Wednesday afternoon when the House of Representatives accepted the adverse report of the railroad committee by a vote of 68 to 62.

OUR WATER SUPPLY

Reservoirs Getting Low—Use of Water To Be Curtailed. The following letter from the South Manchester Water Company is a direct appeal to the people of this place which should be readily complied with.

When the matter came up Representative Hyde of this place gave the history of the bill during the arrangement of the principal tests that the utilities commission will have to deal with the question of rates and the friends of the low rate bill did not expect that they had much chance to force favorable action on their measure when the utilities commission was created for that purpose.

The rainfall of last winter and spring was so far below the normal that the company's reservoirs for the first time since their construction failed to fill and on the last of July, 1911, contained 88,000,000 gallons less than on July 1, 1910. During the week ending July 3, the quantity of water decreased 6,000,000 gallons and during the week ending July 10, there was a further decrease in the water stored of 9,000,000 gallons.

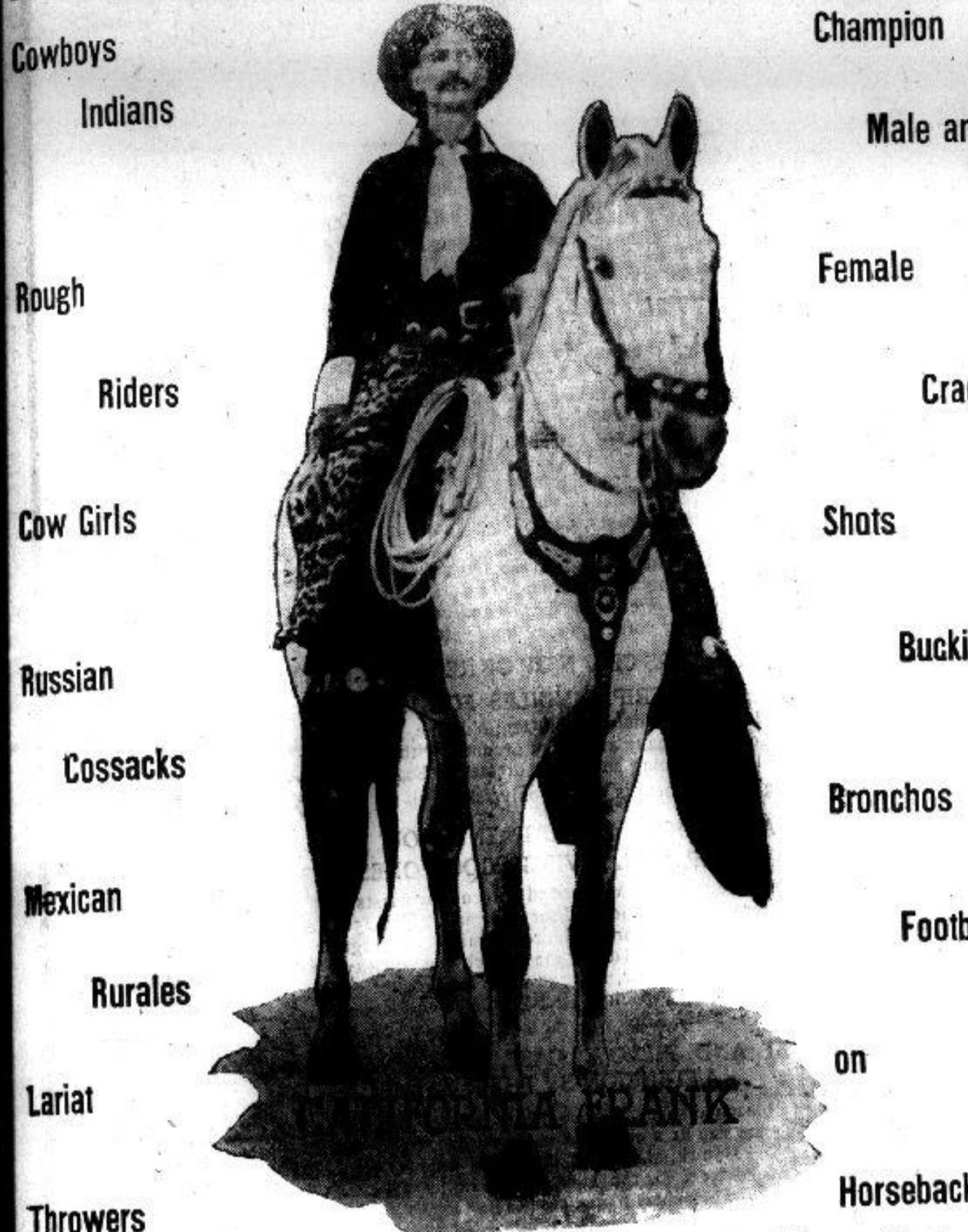

LIABILITY BILL REPORTED.

Compensation Feature Combined in It. Senate Votes Million For New London—Issuance of Securities Bill Recommended.

Hartford, July 12.—Whether or not the Connecticut general assembly will adjourn on the 27th of this month remains to be seen, though there is no newspaper man among the correspondents and reporters who can be made to admit the possibility of such a thing.

Connecticut Company to Supply Its Own Current

Since the tie-up of the East side lines by the blow-out of cables on June 13 and the expiration of the contract with the Hartford Electric Light Company for the furnishing of power for the interurbans is nearly completed, the capacity of the plant is to be largely increased, as is that of the Commerce street power station in Hartford where the turbines have recently been installed at the West street station.
