The War Fifty Years Ago

General McClellan Drives Confederates Out of Western Virginia—Federal Force Under Rosecrans at Rich Mountain Defeats Colonel Pegram, Who, With Remnant of Command, Tries to Rejoin General Garnett.

THE middle of July, 1861, saw the Union armies roughly in the following positions: General Banks was holding down the lid in Baltimore, which was yet under martial law; General Butler was at Fortress Monroe—very still, as a certain famous Democrat said of himself some decades later; General McDowell was just getting ready to move against Beauregard at Manassas.

On July 10 McClellan came in sight of the enemy. To understand the position of the two armies reference should be made to the accompanying map. Garnett with the main body of the Confederates was at Laurel, Colonel Pegram with about 1,500 southern troops was guarding the pass in Rich Mountain, and McClellan with his entire force was at Roaring run, west of the gap.

At first General Garnett tried to return to Beverly and escape to the north, but McClellan was too swift for him and occupied Beverly first. Then the Confederates commander turned north and risked the hazardous chance of ascending past and getting through the mountains by way of St. George.

When a spot made its appearance these kudos were produced and pointed in its direction, waved in the air so that the sign of the Confederate army was seen in the distance.

General Morris and Captain R. W. Benham were sent in pursuit of Garnett. It was easy to trace the fleeing Confederates by the knapsacks and the rations they carried. The race northward began on the 12th, the northern troops having taken the lead.

The Indiana troops were ordered to charge the foe in front, and the Hoosiers swarmed up the banks of the Confederates' ford. Not only were they outnumbered, but their ammunition was almost exhausted.

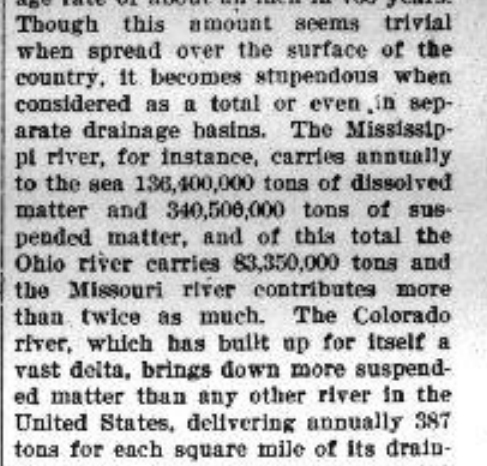

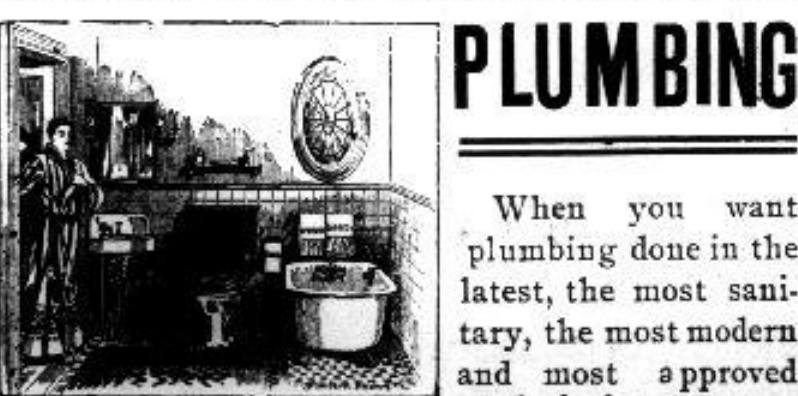

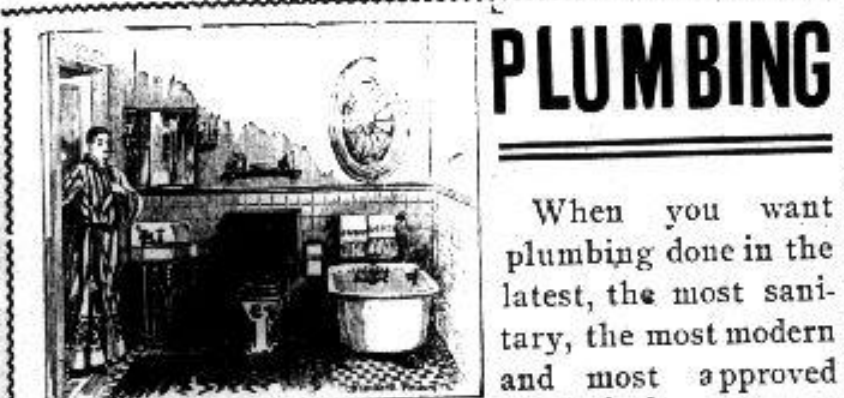

GEORGE F. DAY SEWER CONNECTIONS

It will be recalled that some two months ago George F. Day of Charter Oak street sold to The South Manchester Real Estate Company, his store, lively stable, carriage repository, blacksmithshop, a three-story house on Charter Oak street and two two-story houses on Wells street and was given two months time in which to dispose of the stock in his store, lively stable, carriage repository, etc.

An auction sale was held for the purpose of disposing of the stocks last week Wednesday. The store stock was practically all sold but the other effects were not bringing satisfactory returns and Mr. Day decided to stop the sale which he did.

As a result he entered into negotiations with the new owners of the property for a purchase by him of the store building, the blacksmithshop and also the two tenements on Wells street. Satisfactory arrangements were made and the above described property was deeded back last Tuesday to Mr. Day by The South Manchester Real Estate Company.

The South Manchester Real Estate Company has retained the tenement house on Charter Oak street, which they have had thoroughly overhauled, and also retain the land on Charter Oak street nearly to the blacksmithshop and the land on Wells street nearly to the tenement house next east of The Armory Opera House, which they also own.

They intend to grade off these lots, to cut a street through from Charter Oak street to Wells and thus make room for several nice tenement houses. The building lots will be placed upon the market for sale and will meet with ready purchasers. The land will be on first-class order and will make desirable building lots.

Register Tonight

The registrars of voters in this section this afternoon and evening at the Hall of Records for the purpose of enrolling voters for the caucuses. If you would take part in the coming caucuses of the town this fall it will be necessary for you to be registered.

The registrars will last tonight until nine o'clock. They will also hold another meeting next Friday, August 11 from 12 m to 9 p. m. for the enrolling of voters for the caucuses.

It cannot be urged too strongly upon newly made voters the importance of registering for the caucuses. It must be borne in mind that the voters who were made last fall will not be permitted to vote at the Direct Primary unless they register for same either tonight or one week from tonight.

At the meeting of the selectmen last Tuesday afternoon in the Hall of Records Judge Olin R. Wood gave his legal opinion on the petition of the residents of West Center and Olcott streets who asked the selectmen to define the street lines on those two streets.

The selectmen did not take any action in Judge Wood's opinion in the case. They will take the matter up at the next meeting of the board and in all probability will grant a special hearing for the petitioners to appear and be heard at a later date.

Laying Conduits

Because of the uncertainty of the street lines on a portion of West Center street, The American Telephone and Telegraph Company have been forced to abandon for a time the laying of the underground conduits on that street.

The company has a large gang of men laying the conduits from Manchester Green to Bolton. In the latter place wooden conduits are being laid in the place of the tile conduits used in this town.
