Bought Back Store Building And Other Property

It will be recalled that some two months ago George F. Day of Charter Oak street sold to The South Manchester Real Estate Company, his store, lively stable, carriage repository, blacksmithshop, a three-tenement house on Charter Oak street and two two-tenement houses on Wells street and was given two months time in which to dispose of the stock in his store, lively stable, carriage repository, etc. An auction sale was held for the purpose of disposing of the stocks last week Wednesday. The store stock was practically all sold but the other effects were not bringing satisfactory returns and Mr. Day decided to stop the sale which he did.

As a result he entered into negotiations with the new owners of the property for a purchase by him of the store building, the lively stable, the carriage repository, the blacksmithshop and also the two tenements on Wells street. Satisfactory arrangements were made and the above described property was deeded back last Tuesday to Mr. Day by The South Manchester Real Estate Company.

The building lots will be placed upon the market for sale and will meet with ready purchasers.
