



### GENUINE SALE

Something like 12 or 15 years ago a roung man studied a problem that has long bothered mill owners, but whose solution had baffled them. But the oung man studied his problem profitably for he came to a solution.

The problem was what to do with the ends of goods left after the regulation 40 yards desired by the wholesale customers had been supplied.
