WOMEN HEALTH INSPECTORS.

Head of the New York Health Department Praises Their Work. Dr. Ernest J. Lederle, commissioner of health in New York city, who has a number of women at work in his department, is enthusiastic as to the effectiveness in this line of public service.

Dr. Lederle thinks they are especially valuable as inspectors. He has 225 of them at work for him. "As sanitary and home inspectors women do excellent work for us," says Dr. Lederle. "They have the ability to handle situations and understand conditions that are really not in a man's province."

"As sanitary school and home inspectors they are satisfactory. In certain branches of food work their efforts are insisted and there is nothing but good to be said for them. "Work that calls for inspection in the home rightfully belongs to women, and in such places they show their great value. You see, we have nurses in all schools, and these nurses also cover certain districts where the conditions in the homes of the children.

"Now, if this work were given to men, especially among the foreign homes, where a uniform and badge are feared, far less could be accomplished. The women in such work inspire a confidence among the people that no man could gain. "It is a woman really just home keeping in a large scale."

SELECTMEN ORGANIZE

H. B. Cheney Chosen Chairman and W. E. Alvord Secretary

The newly elected board of selectmen held their first meeting at the Hall of Records last Friday evening when the board organized and made several appointments. All the members of the board were present. Horace B. Cheney who has been the chairman of the board since the new form of town government started was again chosen as chairman and William E. Alvord as secretary. The board also made the following appointments: W. L. Ulrich, road superintendent; John S. Riley, charity superintendent; Olin R. Wood, town counsel; D. N. A. Barr, town physician; Walter W. Cowles 2nd, assessor of weights and measures; and Thomas Gray, junior of the Hall of Records and of the town hall. The board voted to increase the salary of the town physician from \$800 to \$900 a year. Selectmen Alvord, Cheney and Cowles were appointed as members of the joint board of selectmen and school visitors.

The first public meeting of the board will be held at the Hall of Records tomorrow evening at eight o'clock. In the afternoon the board will meet to approve bills against the town. There is a large list of bills against the town, as no bills have been paid since the town books were closed August 15th.

The South Manchester Sewer and Sanitary District petitioned the board for permission to lay a sewer through Olcott street from Cooper to Adams street. The petition was granted.

E. E. Seger explained to the board about the pond which forms on Hilliard street under the railroad bridge after every heavy rain. While making the street almost impassable it is also very unsanitary and he asked the board to look into the matter. Selectmen Cowles and Alvord reported to the board that they were appointed to take the matter up and see if some relief could not be found.

Selectman Cheney was appointed to represent the board of selectmen at the hearing before the Public Utilities Commission at the Capitol next Wednesday afternoon when the commission will hold a public hearing on the petition of Manchester residents for a ten cent trolley fare between this place and Hartford.

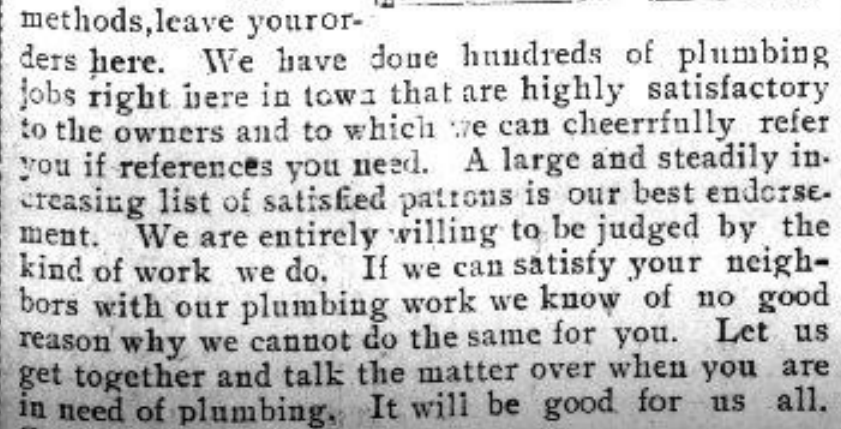

The Physician's Responsibility.

Fifteen years ago it was unsafe to take the Albany water. The doctors of the city advised the agitated public opinion so that a scientific filtration plant was constructed, and today typhoid fever is practically unknown. So with the great problem of tuberculosis which we are all striving so hard to solve. The public is fast being educated, and there is a most determined and commendable effort on the part of all classes and professions to stamp out the disease as effectively as smallpox or cholera. The chief responsibility, however, rests upon the physician, and he is a traitor to himself and to the nobles of his profession if he does not do his duty in the light of the consensus of opinion among the students of his subject is that prompt recognition of this most insidious and proper authorities, as in the case of other communicable and infectious diseases, is essential in the control of tuberculosis.
