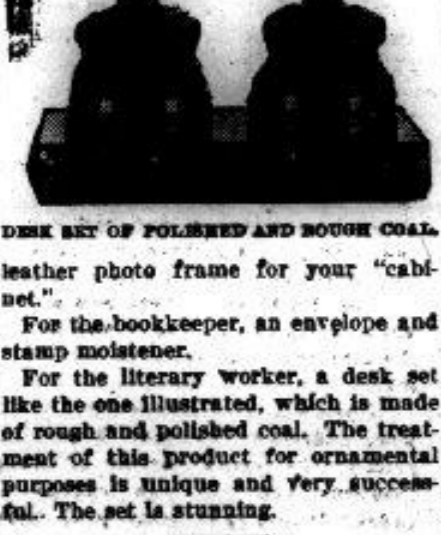

Living demands for stations and lights and demands of this kind were not made on the company in the old home car days.

At this point a recess was declared and Commissioner Higgins might issue a subpoena for Mr. Wickham. The subpoena was prepared to have Mr. Wickham present at 3 o'clock.

Resuming his testimony Mr. Pufferford said that as a result of the demands for improved pavements the company has had to take out and relays that were capable of several years' wear, but the company had always to put in new ties and rails for the new pavements. The widening of rails is an additional expense in connection with an electric service. It costs \$5.50 to weld a joint and with the additional work in connection with the putting back of the pavement to weld a joint costs from \$7 to \$10.

More new cars are coming and there isn't any reason why the service on the Manchester line should be perfect.

THE HALL OF FAME.

DANIEL WEBSTER—Famous American statesman, orator and lawyer. Born Salisbury, N. H., Jan. 17, 1792; died Marshfield, Mass., Oct. 24, 1852. Graduated at Dartmouth in 1811. HARD METALS.

They Came From Titanium and Are as Firm as the Diamond. The diamond has ever been regarded as possessing one quality that placed it beyond rivalry—namely, that of hardness. There are several gems that compete with it in beauty, and at least one—the ruby—when of rare size outranks it in costliness, but none in the whole list equals it in hardness. The hardest steel cannot equal the diamond in that respect.

But there are at least two products of chemical experiment that have proved, according to French chemists, to be as hard as diamonds. These are produced from the rare metal titanium. One experiment, it is claimed, succeeded in producing titanium in the electric furnace. In the pure form it is much harder than steel or quartz, and when combined with silicon or carbon so as to form a silico-titanium or carbide of titanium it matches the diamond in hardness. Titanium resembles tin in its chemical properties, and it is the characteristic element in the beautiful red and brown crystals of rutile. The shape of needles, are sometimes found penetrating large white quartz crystals, forming gems that the French call "bornes arroyes."—New York Press.

KEPT ABOVE GROUND.

Ingenious Way Major Meek Evaded the Terms of a Will. Among ingenious ways of evading a will the plan followed by Major Hook and recorded in "Ancient, Curious and Famous Wills" may be considered. A county newspaper some years ago recorded the death of a Major Hook and spoke of him as "a singular character." "He died," says the report, "on Monday evening at his home, Main street, Erie county. He was an officer in the East India company's service and reached the age of seventy-five. His house was remarkable for its decay and dilapidated condition."

His wife had become entitled to a life annuity, bequeathed to her in these ambiguous terms: "And the same shall be paid to her as long as she is above ground." When, therefore, the good lady died her husband very naturally objected to forfeit his income by putting her below ground and ingeniously devised a mode of keeping her in a room which he allotted "to her sole and separate use," placing a glass case over her remains. For thirty years he thus prolonged his enjoyment. If not of his wife's society, at least of her income.

THE END OF TUBERCULOSIS

Hospitals For Advanced Cases. By DR. WILLIAM H. WELCH. It is so easy to say correctly that this progressive diminution in the amount of tuberculosis, but Koch, Germany and A. J. N. Newbould, the best vital statistician in English speaking countries, came to the conclusion that the factor that has done the most is what is called institutional segregation. That means the isolation of patients with tuberculosis, so far as is possible, in institutions. That should be emphasized today as the central feature of the campaign against tuberculosis, and the greatest hope in this country is a supply of suitable hospitals for these cases of advanced tuberculosis.

Da Vinci's Writings.

Although Leonardo da Vinci was a voluminous writer, he never published a single line during his lifetime. After the master's death in France his manuscripts were taken back to Italy. His books proved unworthy, and the previous writings were gradually dispersed. Loose pages were often detached and were either given away as notes or stored. No attempt was made to publish any of his treatises except that on painting, for more than 200 years after his death. This was partly owing to the great difficulty of deciphering his handwriting. Da Vinci was left handed and always wrote in inverted form, from right to left. Despite this, his orthography is peculiar to himself. He abbreviates some words and joins others together and requires no other stops nor accents. London Chronicle.
