



THE END OF TUBERCULOSIS

Value of Early Diagnosis.

By Dr. CHARLES L. MINOR. In any given case of tuberculosis a sensible doctor can usually tell you whether there is any chance of getting well, but it is worth remembering that quite a number of very bad and apparently hopeless cases do at times recover when it seemed impossible for them to do so. Thus, however bad the outlook, it is sensible not to give up hope,

but to start right in to make the bravest fight you can. 



Calented Irish Lecturer To Be Heard At High School Hall Seumas MacManus, (pronounced thamus") of Donegal. Ireland, the rish writer and lecturer, has been seured by the Compopolitan Club, t ecture at High School Hall Tuesday January 2. 1919. M. McManus will give realings from his own poems and stories. All who are acquainted with Mac nus' Irish stories, in the leading inee, or with his books, need ardly be told he got his knowledge of he wit and humor and poetry and pathos of Irish life at first hand. From his gradle he looked out every day on the rugged mountains and cliffs of wave lashed Donegal; and he heard the Donegal calleens singing round him the old Gaslic lullabies; and listened to the cronies and shanachies, who dropped every night into his father's cottage on the mountain-side, chant the ancient Irish poems and tell the thousand years old legends and tales. In fact, he was suckled on the very lore which he has now for ten years been giving to the American public.

The fourteen or fifteen books of fairy tales and of original story and drama that he has given to the world, since at the age of eighteen he was appointed the mountain schoolmaster, form only a small part of the great wealth of Irish lore which he imbibed as a child. In his "Lad of the O'Friels" and his "Donegal Farry Stories" and his "Ballads of a Country Boy," among others, he gives us Irish life and character and Irish song and Irish story. Irish humor and pathos, combined like the sunshine and mists of his native

As a barefoot boy he was so fond o the old fireside stories that he tramped the hills nightly to hear them in the house of the shanachy, or regular s'ory teller-for every district among the hills of Ireland has its own honored shanachy, who is a repository of all the old lore, and who on the long winter nights entertains the big circle of happy faced on se who listen spell-bound to the tales, sitting around the glowing peat fire, with the yellow firelight ancing over their faces, and flickering over the smoke-blacked rafters above The barefoot boy who sat opennoutned in the corner did not then in his wildest dream imagine that he would one day be telling the same stories to an audience stretching from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific, and from the Great Lakes to the Gulf of Mexico-or that he would be interpreting to all America the poetry and the pathos and wit which he saw and felt and heard around him.

At the age of eighteen he became school master of the little mountain school at which he himself had been taughtto read and write and figure, And after seven years' teaching and dreaming during the day, and writing and dreaming during the night, he bade goodbye to his scholars and old triends and neighbors, and like the hero in his own fairy tales, set out to push his fortune-in America.

From the steerage of a trans-Atlantic tiner he landed here on a beautiful day in Fall ten years ago, his name utterly anknown to anyone in America, except exiled boys and girls from his own mountain parish. After seven months of America he sailed for home in the May following with his bumorous Irish stories printed, and being printed, in every leading magazine in the country, and his first American book, "Through the Turf Smoke," selling in repeated editions from New York to San Fran-
