First Importance.

Modern Factory Production, With the Breakdown of the Apprenticeship System, Must Be Offset by Scientific Management of High Order.

If it can be shown that under scien-

tific management the workman is carefully instructed and trained to perform his work in such a way as to help him develop his highest efficieny without undue physical strain, and at the same time is paid much larger wages for the more effective work he is enabled to do by reason of the training which he receives and the character of the working conditions thrown around him, then it may fairly be said that the effect of scientific management upon the workman is

without systematic guidance or train-

Not infrequently a workman will ap-

ply for a job for which he knows he is

not competent, hold it until his incom-

charge as a matter of course, get an-

other job of the same kind in another

plant and continue his procedure until

he has learned the trade sufficiently

well to hold a place. The workman cannot be blamed for this practice, and yet it is obviously fearfully waste-

ful of human capacities and produces

poorly equipped workmen.
