### FOR DOUBLE TRACKS

#### West Center and Olcott Street Tracks To Be Centered

The Connecticut Company have petitioned the board of selectmen for permission to change the location of their trolley tracks on West Center and Olcott streets from the Center to McKee street and in their petition make request that they be allowed to double track that part of the line.

In planning the improvements on West Center and Olcott streets the selectmen thought that the trolley tracks should be in the center of the highway and it was deemed advisable to double-track the line at the same time. The board advised the company of their wishes and when in progress before the Utility Commission recently Chairman H. B. Cheney of the board of selectmen was told that the company had agreed to do as requested in the matter.

There is little doubt that the company's petition will be granted as it will eliminate many dangerous crossings, will improve the service and will add to the appearance of the highway.

The many obstacles which appeared when the improvements on these two streets were first considered are fast disappearing and everything seems to point to a successful carrying out of the plan. The Highway Commissioner has assured the board that he will use all money available to this town for the improvements, the South Manchester Railroad Co. will erect a new bridge over West Center street, the property owners along the two highways have asked permission to lay curbing, and the South Manchester Sanitary & Sewer District promise to lay a storm water sewer down the West Center street hill so that the prospects are now looking up bright for the construction of a fine thoroughfare along that section.

At the regular meeting of South Manchester Council No. 49 F. B. L. last evening at Forester hall the following selections of delegates and alternates to the supreme convention of the League were made: delegates: John F. Miner and Stephen R. Beebe; alternates: Herman Montie and Clarence Taylor.
