An Increase of Over One Million Dollars Over Last Year-Board of Relief Made Exemp. tions of Over Fifty-Four Thousand Dollars.

The board of relief finished its work lest evening and a list of tax exemptions appears below. While the board made some exemptions to the list it also made some additions.
