Textile School

Continued From Page One

The cost of the school will be from \$1,000 to \$1,500 for the town, and Cheney Brothers will be called upon for an expenditure of between \$1,000 and \$2,000. The town will not be called upon at this time to make any appropriation for the establishing of the school, as the district committee has made arrangements with the school board to transfer a portion of the money already appropriated for school purposes to be used in connection with the textile school. Mr. Cheney also spoke of the payment of wages for goods that were made in the school that had a marketable value. He said that under the law he did not believe the town could pay money wages for such goods. However, money might be paid to students as bonuses for good work.

E. T. Ferris wished to know if the school would be confined to the instruction of the textile branches. To this Mr. Cheney replied that the school would start with the textile instruction first, but that later if the town saw fit it might add other branches. He said that the proper way to do the thing would be for the town to own and equip a building and have a trade school wherein all the different trades that were required would be taught. He said that a school of this kind has almost unlimited possibilities.

E. B. Cheney called the attention of the meeting to the fact that Cheney Brothers pay all of the cost of the text training and all the other money required to do it is to pay for the academic training it does now.

Following this discussion the resolution of Mr. Cheney for the establishing of a Textile School of Manual Arts was passed.

Mr. Cheney then read the following letter from Cheney Brothers:

The Ninth School District of Manchester, N. H.
South Manchester, Conn.
Gentlemen:

We hereby offer to the Ninth School District of Manchester, N. H., for the purpose of a Textile School of Manual Arts such quarters as may be mutually deemed necessary by the School Committee and ourselves for the conduct of said school, and to supply such furniture, equipment and machinery as are required for the conduct of said school, we to assume all expenses which are properly incidental to the operation of such machinery and to the heating, lighting and repairs of a building and equipment.

We further offer to supply such yards and textile materials as are used in the making of goods of a marketable quality in such quantities as may be required.

We further agree to reimburse the Ninth School District for the amount of the salaries of all instructors of the manual training, providing the appointment of such instructors is subject to our approval.

It is understood that this offer, if accepted, shall go into effect on April 15, 1912, and shall be renewed at the annual district meeting, either party however, to the agreement, to have the privilege of withdrawing from the same at any time, the expiration of a three months notice.

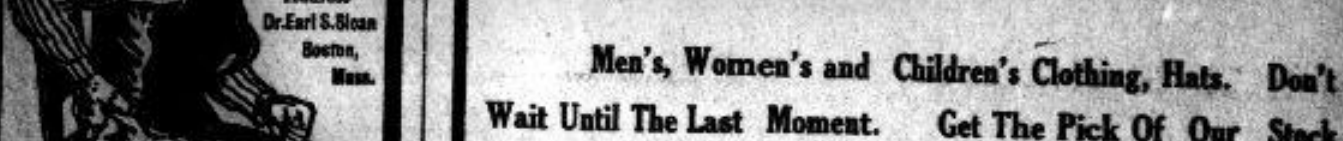

FRANK GOETZ

SUCCESSFUL BUSINESS MAN AND MANUFACTURER DIED TUESDAY

Man of Much Executive Ability and Indefatigable Worker—Had Center for Overcoming Business Obstacles—Started Small But Moved Upward

The community was greatly shocked Wednesday morning by the news that Frank Goetz had died the night previous at the St. Francis Hospital following an operation for appendicitis which had been performed upon him a week prior to his death. Most people hereabouts had not even known of his illness, as he had lived in New Haven, Conn. Mr. Goetz was for many years one of our most active, energetic and successful business men. He had capacity for hard work that practically knew no limits and drove on the high speed gear almost incessantly. He was a man of towering ambition, was brimful of progressive business ideas and would allow no impediment, however great to arrest his business progress. He had a genius for overcoming difficulties and was blessed with a good wife of much the same qualifications. They made a splendid team of successful workers.

With all his business cares Mr. Goetz was a great fraternal man and gave as much of his valuable time to their public functions as he could spare. Mr. Goetz was a member of Manchester Lodge, A. F. & A. M., Elks Lodge, David Lodge, O. E. F., Manchester Lodge, Elks Lodge, Manchester Lodge, Tent K. O. T. M., South Manchester Camp M. W. of A., Pythagoras Chapter, R. A. M., Wolcott Council, R. E. S. M., Washington Commandery K. T., Hartford Lodge, B. P. O. Elks and Sphinx Temple of the Mystic Order. The funeral took place from the home of Mr. Goetz at 117 Main Street at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Rev. J. Biddle, formerly pastor of St. Mary's church officiated. Manchester Lodge of Masons turned out in a body and took charge of the burial which was in the Elm cemetery. The bearers were members of the Masonic Lodge. Delegates from all the lodges of which Mr. Goetz was a member were present as was also a delegation from the Manchester Business Men's Association. Mr. Goetz was not a member of the local association, but the latter wished to show that mark of respect to one of our town people who had made such a success in the business world. A quartet consisting of C. Elmer, William J. Bessell, N. C. Ingalls and E. N. Parker sang at the home. The floral tributes were many and contained a large number of set pieces from the different fraternities of which the deceased was a member.

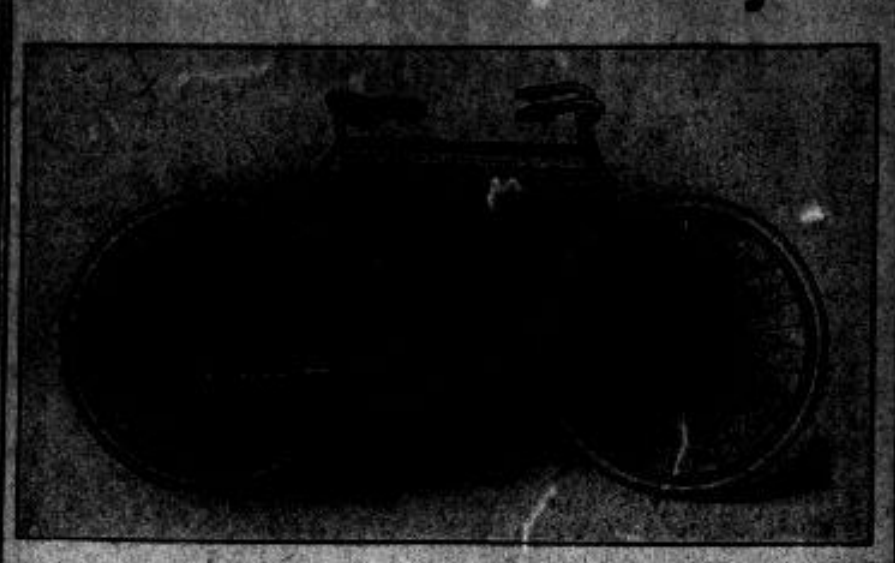


