TOWN MEETING LAST EVENING HAS LONG AND INTERESTING SESSION

Improvements Voted For West Center Street. School Lines Adopted. Centering Trolley Tracks on Main St. Deferred. Will Report Cost of Same.

The special town meeting held at the town hall last evening attracted a good sized body of voters. The centering of the trolley tracks on Main street, which was the principal business of the meeting, brought forth a number of advocates and also a few who opposed the change.

The extension of Eldridge street was voted and an appropriation of \$8000 was made therefor. \$5000 was voted for improvements on West Center street.

Chairman H. B. Cheney of the board of selectmen called the meeting to order and E. L. G. Hobeathal was chosen moderator. Town Clerk Burton recorded the proceedings.

After reading the call the first section relating to the changing of the lines of the Third School District was taken up. C. H. Hathaway offered a resolution for the adoption of the change which was voted.

The second section related to the addition of a portion of the South East Third School District of East Hartford to the Sixth School District of this town. Mr. Hathaway offered a resolution which gave the bounds of the district.

E. L. G. Hobeathal objected to the change saying it would place him in the Sixth School District while he is in the Ninth. He had been to considerable trouble to find out in which district he really is and a town meeting had declared that his property is in the Ninth. He did not propose to have a football made out of either himself or his property regarding this matter.

Mr. Hathaway contended that the change as he suggested would not alter Mr. Hobeathal's position in the Ninth district. Mr. Hobeathal would not take any chances in allowing Mr. Hathaway's resolution to go through and offered a motion to indefinitely postpone.

Section 4 of the warrant which related to centering the trolley tracks on Main street was taken up and John Cairns moved that action on that section be deferred until the other sections in the warrant were acted upon.

H. M. Burke said that it made no difference whether the section was taken up at this time or deferred, because, according to the statutes, the meeting could not take action as this power is vested with the selectmen.

H. B. Cheney said that the clause was inserted in the warrant for two purposes. In the first place it was at the request of a number of the legal voters of the town and the selectmen had been petitioned in the proper manner and were compelled to have it in the call. The selectmen also wanted to find out how the voters stood on the question and as the improvements would mean the building of a highway the voters had something to say on that question.

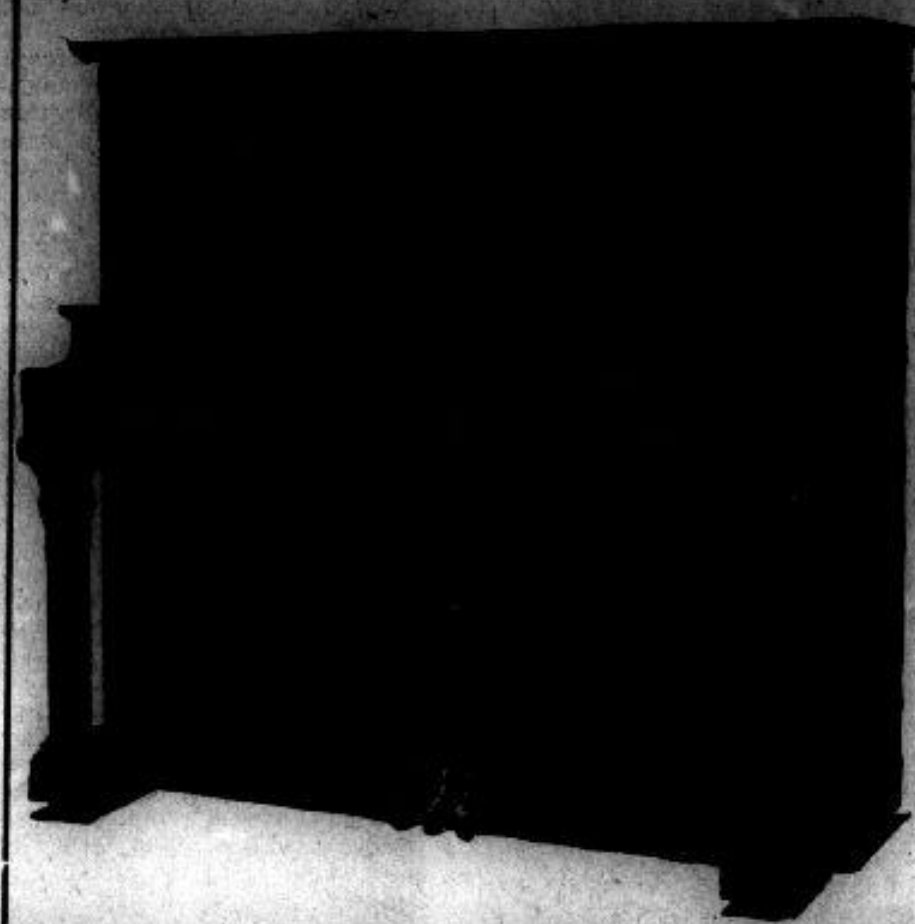

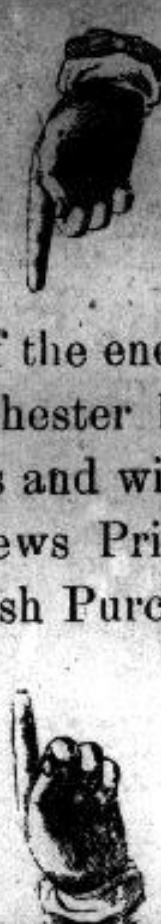

### MUST BE INITIATIVE

To Succeed in Life It Is Necessary to "Get Ahead of the Business."

### ONE GOOD CASE IN POINT

Different Positions in Which Two Men, Starting With Equal Advantages, Find Themselves Now That They Are at Middle Age.

Two former schoolmates are connected with the management of a big and opulent bank. One is a director, worth several million dollars, while the other is a cashier drawing a salary of \$5 a week. Both had the same educational opportunities. They were graduated from high school in the same year and their parents were able and willing to give them a fair start in life.

But the boy who later became a prince of financiers greatly disappointed his parents in the selection of a business. Offers of positions all of which promised future advancement were made to him by his father's friends. He became a book agent because the possibility of making his money appealed to him, and from that he graduated into the rank of insurance agent. Later he became a real estate salesman, and then he switched to automobiles.

His ups and downs were many. He was forced early in life to become calloused to the rebuffs of his fellow men. In a slightly modified form his experiences resembled those of his prehistoric brother whose battle for food against the beasts of the forest and his unchristened neighbors was most often a battle for his very life itself.

Gifted with less self-assurance, his companion became a clerk in the bank, where his salary was certain and where only the faint din of the battle could be heard. His integrity and application were beyond reproach. His courtesy and politeness to the patrons of the bank were incomparable. Today at the age of forty, although he is a fine fellow socially, he is not a big man. He devotes himself to the study of detail, and never having experienced the necessity of thinking along original lines, he is somewhat commonplace and unconstructive. Some people he is in a rut.

### TO INSURE EMPLOYERS

KANSAS MANUFACTURERS ESTABLISH EXCHANGE.

### LEGISLATIVE PROBLEMS ARE ALSO BE HANDLED BY THEM IN A COMPREHENSIVE MANNER.

Kansas manufacturers with an aggregate payroll of more than two and one-half million dollars have formed the Kansas Employers' Inter-Insurance Exchange.

The plan of the exchange originated with the millers' organization, but the brick, glass, cement and other manufacturers almost immediately asked to be allowed to cooperate with the millers. The exchange then was enlarged to include selected risks in other industries where the employment was not deemed extra hazardous. Mining and other dangerous occupations are excluded.

The exchange purports to furnish practically net cost indemnity and in addition expects to take part in legislative problems, confronting the Kansas employers. The exchange will maintain a bureau for the information of its members on all matters pertaining to employers' liability, proposed changes in laws and proposed new laws.

Since the exchange pays no agents' commissions, it is slightly undercutting the public companies for the business. The financial affairs of the exchange are administered through trustees, selected from among the subscribers.

### RIGHT KIND OF MAN

Quality of Dependability One of the Most Valuable of Business Assets.

### MATTER TO BE CULTIVATED

Prospective Employer Certain to Make This More or Less a Requirement for Position or Promotion.

There were assembled in New York city the other day a score or more of business men, interested in a great enterprise. They had gathered to select a manager for their investment, and had considered one name after another when that of a comparatively young man was brought to their attention. When his name was announced a well known banker remarked: "I believe that is the man we want. When I was president of the Central National bank he was employed as a clerk. One day when I was sitting in my office he asked me if I would personally loan him some money, telling me the purpose to which he wished to put it. I asked him if he could offer any security. He said he could not, nothing except his word that he would pay back the money on a certain day. He returned the money as agreed, and so far as I know he has ever since made good. I believe he is the man we want, for he can be depended on."

### SCIENCE NOTES.

The United States geological survey and Maine authorities are working together to produce a topographic map of that state that will be 22 feet high by 28 wide.

Pennsylvania's record breaking coal production last year was nearly one-fifth of all the coal mined in the world in that period.

Of the 12,000,000 tons of iron ore which Spain mines each year only about 3,000,000 tons are used at home, the rest being exported.

A motor plow for throwing up trenches on a battlefield to afford protection to soldiers is a recent invention.

Roughened plates, which may be attached to a man's foot from slipping as he climbs a ladder.

A machine to hold a drill by which it may be sharpened by hand on an ordinary whetstone has been invented in England.

A simple faucet which can be locked to prevent the misuse of the contents of a barrel to which it is fastened has been devised by a Pennsylvania inventor.

For testing the dangers of mines goes a delicate machine has been invented in England which photographically measures the duration of the flash of an explosion.

A combined colander and fruit press invented by a Minnesota man has a revolving blade which is screwed down into the contents of the utensil as a handle is turned.

### Pittsburgh's Big Pay Roll.

In a great manufacturing center millions of dollars are distributed each week to workmen that mean increased business for merchants in every line, patronage and pay for many in all professions, adding to the wealth of real estate, the resources of banks and all local investments.

Pittsburgh's business is good. In \$1,000,000 a day, The Pittsburgh Dispatch reports that 15 establishments paid out to their employees before Christmas \$4,750,000, and the addition of \$397,000 paid public school teachers.

Public school teachers in Pittsburgh nearly \$5,000,000 in Christmas money was turned loose in the steel and iron center. Many of the workmen are well-to-do, but many are poor and need the money.
