By DR. WILLIAM S. ELY. Tuberculosis of the lungs, the mest contagious and fatal form of the disease, is caused by the presence of tubercle bacilli (germs) in the lungs. The germ multiplies rapidly and feeds on the lung substance, which it gradually destroys.

The important symptoms of consumption are cough expectoration (or spitting of phiegm hemorrhage (or bleeding from the lungs), fever (increased temperature of the body, especially in the evening), difficulty in breathing, pains in the chest, night sweats, loss of appetite, emaciation (loss of flesh).

The germ of consumption enters the system in three waysfirst, by being inhaled or breathed into the lungs; second, by being ingested—that is, eaten in tuberculous food or drank in milk or water contaminated with the germ; third, by thecu-lation or the penetration of tu-berculous substance through a round in the skin. Take out the water pans then and after two or three minutes slack heat one-half and finish baking. The time will, of course, depend on the size and kind of cake.




