

SMALLER COINS

3-Cent Piece With Hole Half Cent With Scalloped Edges

The Treasury Department hs withdrawn its opposition to the coinage of additional denominations of money and is not opposing the bill introduced by Representative Bulkeley of Obic providing for a 3-c-nt and one-half cent pieces. George E. Robert, director of the mint has declared that the Treas ury is passive in the matter and will offer no obj ction if precautions are taken to guarantee distinctiveness i

The o'd three-cent pi ces were retired because they resembled the dimes too closely and until recently the Treasury consistently opposed an increase in the denominations of coins.

If the bill is enacted into law the three-cent piece will be made about the size of a nickel with ei her a hole in the center or a scalloped edge. The design of the on + balf cent place will be considerably smaller than the dime and will have a scalloped edge. These designs have been practically agreed upon in conferences between treasury officials and members of Congress.

Quite a demaid for the three-cent pieces has come from Cleveland, where the 3-cent fare on street cars has been adopted. Tressury officials foresee opposition to the bill from traction companies because of the fear that its enactment might renew agi ation for the 8-cent fare. The coinage of a 1-cent piece is being edvocated on the ground that is would result in many articles now selling for a panny being reduced
