### BUSINESS MEN MEET

#### RECEIVE REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LAWN FESTIVAL AND CONCERT

Goodly Sum Realized and Turned Over To Proper Authorities—Milk Station and Public Playgrounds Well Patronized—Movement Fine Success

The regular monthly meeting of the Manchester Business Men's Association took place at Oxford House Company's headquarters last evening. In the absence of the president, W. E. Hubbard, Vice President Charles E. House presided. Clarence W. Johnson of Wapping was elected a member of the association. There are a number of other applications for membership in the hands of members who were absent last evening and consequently did not present them.

Robt. V. Treat for the committee on the Child's Welfare Movement reported the total receipts of the recent lawn festival on the Cheney hall lawn as being \$555.75. The total expenses were \$208.14, leaving a net balance of \$347.61. This sum was turned over to the treasurer of the Manchester Business Men's Association and in turn will be forwarded to the committee having the Child's Welfare Movement in charge.

The committee in their report extended their thanks on behalf of the Manchester Business Men's Association, to the Educational Club, to Mrs. Ednah D. Cheney, to the Boy Scouts and to all others who contributed toward making the lawn festival and concert such a fine success.

O. F. Toop reported for the Child's Welfare Movement that the committee of the Manchester Business Men's Association met a committee of the Educational Club last evening and the joint committee organized by electing the following officers: O. F. Toop, chairman; Mrs. H. O. Bowers, secretary; R. LaMotte Russell, treasurer. Mr. Toop said that the project was meeting with fine success, that the public playgrounds are well patronized, that the milk station is growing in popularity day by day, and that the nurse find plenty of work caring for babies. This branch has increased to such an extent that it became necessary to employ an additional nurse, which has been done. Provision is being made to care for infants at the Open Air school ground building in cases where they have not suitable accommodations at their homes. Cots and other appliances will be provided and every possible done for the care of the little ones until they recover sufficiently to be returned to their homes and placed in charge of their mothers.

The matter of the proposed entertainment at the Circle Theater for the fund of the Child's Welfare Movement was brought up. It was explained that action would be taken upon this proposal on within the next ten days.

### THE HALL OF FAME.

ARA GRAY—Eminent botanist. Born Paris, N. Y., Nov. 18, 1810; died Cambridge, Mass., Jan. 20, 1888. He graduated from a medical college in 1834, but soon abandoned his professional study. He was appointed botanist of the Wilkes expedition in 1843, and resigned in 1847 and traveled in Europe. In 1842 made Fisher professor of natural history in Harvard and retained the chair till 1873. His great work was the "Flora of North America," and this established his place as the foremost American botanist.
