SOUTH MANCHESTER NEWS FRIDAY OCTOBER 27 1912

In the past years, the leoding newspapers of our neighboring cities, such as Hartford, New Britaiu, Soringfield, Worcester, etc., after having had occasion to study conditions under no-license, are unanimous for a well regulated license, and for the support of the law, and a safe and orderly life in the cities which they represent. They have not decided hastily and ehis is one of the things they care nothing about, politics. It is ridiculous to pretend that these papers are all misinformed, or that they are unable to form a fair judgment. Their only concern is a solvtion of this serious problem.

The Hartford Times, in an editorial, said, "We, and probably all the others, are satisfied that where the prohibition law exists in a large town or city, it is never enforced effectively. It fosters illegal selling, eucourages the sale of whiskey, instead of beer and light beverages, because it is less bulky, and more easily concealed, and deprives the city of a large license revenue, in the case of Hartford, about \$70,000 per year." Manchester When "No-License" Loses \$5,000.00 per year.

The editorial further states that an additional loss of at least two million dollars per annum is entriled by the city, through the loss of rents by the real estate owners, wages to employees, and citizens thrown out of employment, loss of insurance, but most of all, tha loss to the merchants because of the general populace going to towns where license is in force for their general merchandise. No license in past years did not decrease drunkeness but did decrease business in Manchester.

Their neighboring cities have cast large majorities FOR LICENSE in the past

years, not wishing to disturb the existing prosperous conditions. WORCESTER. no-license three years ago, voted yearly for license in its favor. The eminent clergymen'all over the country advocate a licence regulated by law, instead of the conditions which exist under no-licehse, when women ann children can purchose whiskey of the vilest kind, unner the guise of soft drinks. The conditions of depravity and immorality caused by these "speak Easies," which exist under no-license, from the cellar to the attic, cannot be stated in statistics.

The New York Evening Journal in its editorial of August 23rd, 1912, says as follows: "THE TRUTH about the prohibition movement, in which a minority seeks to control a majority is as follows: PROHIBITION, or no license, has increased the amount of whiskey dsinking in the United States. PROHIBITION has succeeded in injuring the sale of harmless drinks. PROHIBITION HAS INCREASED THE AMOUNT OF DRUNKENESS in the United States. PROHIBITION means more drunkeness, and those who really and sincerely oppose drunkeness and excessive whiskey drinking, should be the honest and open opponents of mistoken prohibition and its mistaken friends. EDUCATION, better conditions, greater comtort, moral persursion. these are the forces which diminish drunkeness, and cure the habits which destroy."

Why disturb satisfactory conditions, only to inflict a severe loss to the general public. Why revert to a theory which is impractical and inopeative, as prohibition, or no license, has proven itself to be.


