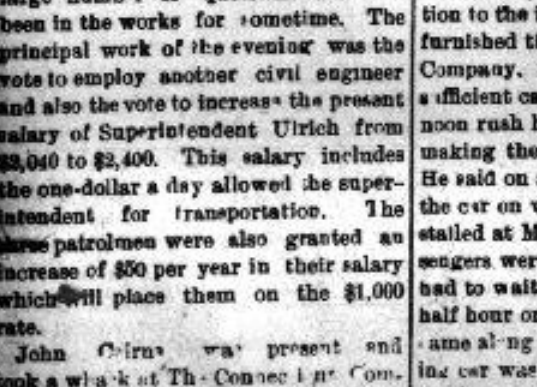
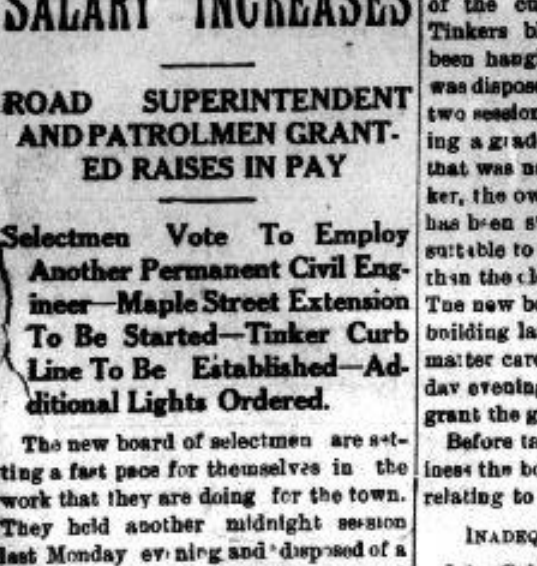

THE POLITICAL SITUATION
His Trust Attitude Firm, Conservative and Effective.
OPPOSES POLITICAL NOSTRINGS

Recall of Judges a Man to Independence of Justice—Declares Trust Attitude on the Integrity of His Position Are Baseline and Vicious.

President Taft discusses the issues of the present campaign in the Saturday Evening Post. He takes his stand squarely on the issue that with him rests the responsibility of maintaining the high standard set up in the records of his party and of carrying out those policies of his predecessors which he declares have made good government and Republicanism synonymous.

The greater part of his argument, which is the first of three to be written by the chief candidates for the presidency, is devoted to a review of tariff legislation during his administration and to the reasons for opposing the bills set before him for a reduction of duties before they had been investigated by the tariff board.

He says he signed the Payne tariff bill because, above all, it provided the machinery by which alone, in his opinion, a just and intelligent revision of the tariff could be effected; because it gave the executive the power to set maximum and minimum rates to get proper treatment for American products from foreign nations; because it imposed a tax on corporations and gave the way for government insight into their operations; because it provided a means of collecting revenue quickly in case of emergency; because it granted a larger measure of justice to the Filipino and finally because it did provide for a material reduction in tariff rates, not so much of a reduction as he would have liked to see, but as much as he believed it was possible to obtain without the machinery of the tariff board which the law created. He disapproved of a tariff bill passed because he was in a measure to the American workman.

Coming to those measures of his administration which have been passed in the interests of social justice, the president sets down first the railway rate bill, which he describes as the most important of the social justice legislation in the Hepburn act. It gave authority to the Interstate Commerce Commission in many details that had been lacking and added powers of supervision over express companies, telegraph, telephone and cable lines. It authorized the institution of investigations of rates before formal complaint had been made, the protection of water hauls from unfair competition and enacted a long and short haul clause that has proved valuable to many communities.

President Taft asserts that his trust policy has been firm, consistent and effective in spite of the enmity of those business interests which he knew it would arouse. He points out that forty-four cases against trusts were instituted during his term, that one-half year that Mr. Roosevelt was president, while during the less than four years of his own administration twenty-two civil suits against forty-five trusts were instituted. He says that the criminal indictments have been brought.

To what is the nature of the reform of judges and of judicial opinion, holding them a measure to the independence of the judiciary.

"As we listen to the demagogic or factious utterances," he says, "let us not forget that votes are not won, referendums do not pass, pay rent or furnish homes, recall do not provide clothing, literature do not supply education or relieve inequality of condition or opportunity. For any definite plans from those who advocate nostrings which will promote equality of opportunity and ameliorate hardships we listen in vain."

"As to the Chicago convention, the president declares that no consideration of party zeal or personal ambition would tempt him to stand as a presidential candidate did he not know that the attacks upon the integrity of his nomination are as baseless as they are vicious."

WHAT IS BEST FOR US
 The town of Manchester is unusually situated in that it is practically dependent for its existence upon the industry, the manufacture of silk. As that industry prospers or languishes, the whole town and well-being of the town advances or recedes. To those persons then who live and own property in the town of Manchester and who expect to live here, there is a community of interest. This industry is dependent also upon its existence upon a protective tariff. If duties were removed from silk, roods, or if those duties were fixed with the sole view of obtaining the maximum amount of duty from the imports, it would follow as a natural sequence that silk would be a natural product of those lands which are now the source of it. The industry of the United States would be destroyed. This fact has been clearly demonstrated by the history of the silk industry in England. Up to the year 1800 England had a protective tariff upon silk, and built up an enormous and lucrative business in the manufacture of silk goods, employing 100,000 people and importing over 8,000,000 lbs. per annum of raw silk. As that time the English tariff on silk was 100 per cent. The result of that tariff was that the industry had increased three or four times in value. In this regard the fact that the wages paid in England in the silk industry are only about half those paid in the United States. During this same period in which England's silk business was vanishing the United States reversed their policy and adopted a protective tariff upon silk manufacturers with the result that starting at 1500 a job, a business employing only about 4,000 hands they have built up a business employing over 100,000 people, employing at wages twice as high as in England, manufacturing products worth nearly \$200,000,000 and their imports of manufactured silk have become constant, showing that this industry has been developed out of the increased use of silk in this country and through the decrease in price to the consumer thereby brought about. For it is true that the old Chey Brothers' made here in the sixties, which sold at \$2.25 per yard can now be purchased for 60c per yard; that the foulards which are at the present time the greatest item of production in these mills have decreased over 50 per cent. in price while wages have at the same time increased.
