It may also be employed by the selectmen to inspect any street or streets with a view to their acceptance or rejection as public highways by the town. It may also be called on whenever it becomes necessary for the board to have any information at first hands concerning any property about which there is any question in which the Town of Manchester is interested. There are many occasions when the town automobile can serve the selectmen to good advantage when they are in quest of information which will enable them the better to understand the real status of any question which has to do with the highways or properties about which there is any dispute, contention or case for inspection whatsoever. Selectman Rogers is prepared to carry out the wishes of the board in this particular and to secure the necessary information whenever public necessity may demand.

Would Sell Ice Plant

Wesley Hollister, one of our local ice dealers, has made an offer to the board of selectmen to sell his ice-plant on the Manchester-East Hartford town line for the sum of \$6,000. Mr. Hollister says that the plant includes 25 acres of as good and rich land as there is in town, also has two ice houses having a capacity of 1,000 tons each. The ice houses are in good repair.

It will be recalled that at a recent special town meeting the matter of establishing a municipal ice plant was discussed and a committee of the selectmen was raised for the purpose of looking into the feasibility of establishing a municipal ice plant here and report at a subsequent town meeting to be held not later than October 1913. The committee consists of Selectmen Schilling, Case and Sheridan.

This offer by Mr. Hollister opens the way for the town to enter into the ice business if it is deemed a wise business proposition. Mr. Hollister says that he made the offer in good faith and that he stands ready to deliver the goods if the committee want to take the matter of having a municipal ice plant store. He says that he believes it would be a far more profitable proposition than his ice business. Mr. Hollister claims that he would gladly lay down the town's business if the municipality care to take them up.

Ford Autos Reduced

W. E. Linscott, local agent for the Ford automobiles informed a representative of The News, this week last beginning today, August first, the selling price of automobiles will undergo a reduction in price. The figures today are as follows: For the Ford runabouts, \$265 each, and for the Ford touring cars \$375 each. This is a reduction of \$50 on each car sold today and hereafter until further notice. 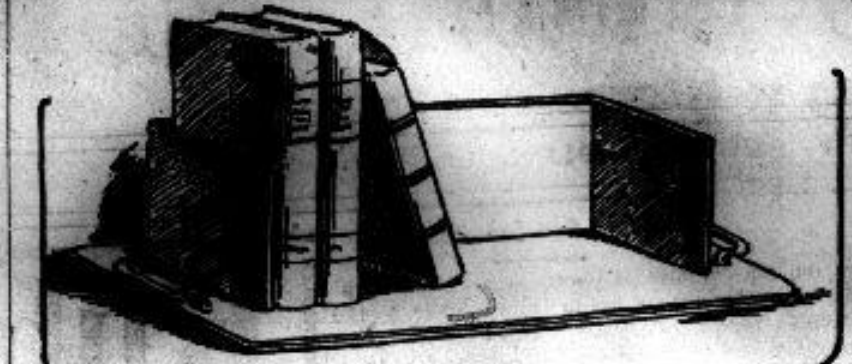
