LAST EVENING TO CLOSE BOOKS AND BUSINESS FOR FISCAL YEAR

Over Eleven Thousand Dollars New In Town Treasury

Price of Alms House Property Added To Fund Today—Busy Evening For Town Fathers

The town of selection held a special meeting at hall of records last evening and after approving bills they got a chance to find out how much money will be in the town treasury after the close of the year.

There was a balance of \$27,000 and to this will be added the check for the purchase of the alms house which will bring the balance up to \$11,200. The board voted to pay the balance of the year's interest on the bonds at the rate of \$2.50 for each meeting attended. There were 29 meetings during the year.

Patrons for payment walk and curbing were received from the following: A. B. Pines, W. L. Buckland, A. J. Straw, H. O. Bowers, F. H. Jones and W. W. C. Brown. The board voted to have the highway department do the work.

In order to discontinue the town's assumption that it is to use by the highway department it was voted to have it lettered as follows: "Town of Manchester, Highway D.P."

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Forms notifying property owners of sidewalk leanings and the return of same were adopted by the board. A long list of tax delinquents on the list of 1911 was re-estimated. It totaled \$680. After considerable discussion it was voted to delegate to the board the duty to see for the board in conjunction with Tax Collector Hyde and Presenting Attorney W. B. Hyde.
