Method of Bleaching Ivory. To bleach ivory ornaments or piano keys the following method works well. The ornaments are first washed with clean water. Then they are put in a solution of soda ash and water. This solution is made by mixing one pound of soda ash with one gallon of water. The ivory is left in this solution for 24 hours. It is then washed with clean water and dried in a warm place.

WHAT WAS SPENT

SELECTED GOVERNMENT FIGURES FOR TOWN REPORT

Some Departments Show Balance While Others Are Overdrawn—Increased Appropriation To Be Asked for Next Year—10-Mill Tax Needed

The selectmen in special session last evening were over the financial figures that have been prepared by Henry L. Vinton of the different town departments and some interesting facts were brought to light relative to the appropriations made last year. The expenditures and the balance or overdraw amounts a they have incurred, which were as follows:

Charity department, appropriation \$10,000, expended \$12,833.89, balance \$2,833.89.

Highway department, \$28,000, expended \$27,877.95, balance \$122.05.

New Town farm \$7,500, balance \$7,500.

West Center and Old street, appropriation \$10,000, expended \$10,143.31, over \$143.31.

Police, appropriation \$9,170, expended \$9,193, balance \$23.

Parks and spraying, \$2,000, expended \$1,744.44, balance \$255.56.

Municipal Day \$10,000, expended \$10,000, balance \$0.

Sanitary Town Hall and miscellaneous appropriation, \$12,700, expended \$12,224.64, balance \$475.36.

New almshouse building appropriation \$22,500, expended \$22,433.01, balance \$66.99.

Public works, appropriation \$20,000, expended \$19,800, balance \$200.

Schools appropriation \$70,181, expended \$71,882.89, balance \$1,701.81.

Verisacres appropriation \$1,500, expended \$1,500, balance \$0.

Wages appropriation \$10,000, expended \$10,000, balance \$0.

After reviewing these figures and reporting thereon in a paper read and referred to the board, it was voted that the following appropriations be asked for in the next year: \$10,000 for charity, \$28,000 for highway, \$7,500 for farm, \$10,000 for West Center and Old street, \$9,170 for police, \$2,000 for parks and spraying, \$10,000 for municipal day, \$12,700 for sanitary town hall and miscellaneous, \$22,500 for new almshouse building, \$20,000 for public works, \$70,181 for schools, \$1,500 for verisacres, and \$10,000 for wages.

Secretary Taylor was authorized to prepare the necessary motion for appropriation that be presented to the town meeting and he was also instructed to prepare the call for the annual town meeting and legal assistance if necessary.

The contract for sidewalks and curbing on Main street from Middle Church street to the corner of North School street was awarded to Woodbridge street by the board.

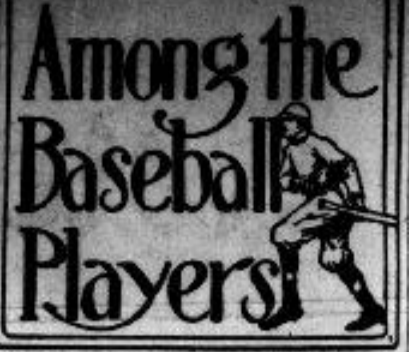

Obituary

WILLIAM B. NICHOLS. William B. Nichols, for many years a resident of this town, died at St. Francis hospital, Monday, September 1 at 11 a. m., after an illness of eight weeks.

Mr. Nichols entered the hospital July 10 for an operation from which he entirely recovered.

While still convalescing, dropsy developed. For a time it was thought he would recover sufficiently strong to return home, but three weeks ago there came a return for the worse, and for sixty hours previous to death r Nichols was unconscious.

During the greater part of the time since the change for the worse members of Mr. Nichols family were at his bedside, and Frank, the eldest surviving son with his father, wife and family.

The funeral was held in St. Francis church, at 10 o'clock, Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Stephen E. Ellis, pastor of the church officiated.

Interment was in the East cemetery in the family lot. Mr. Nichols was born in Winochet, Conn., November 8, 1852.

He was a member of the Knights of St. John, and the Grand Lodge of the East. In early life he moved to Manchester and was employed at the Union mill. Later he became employed at paper

making, which occupation he followed until several years ago. He was one time resident of Burnside, later moved to Rockland, Delaware, where he lived during the Civil war.

For a number of years he was employed at the Granite mill in Yorkville, and the last of his working days were with Case Brothers of Highland Park.

Mr. Nichols was a republican in politics and in his last illness read the daily papers thoroughly. He was a member of the Fremont Veteran association of Hartford at one time and joined meetings with it.

He was a member of the South County and Clinton G. of South Manchester, Captain J. M. Nichols of Attitash, Mass. mill, the South County, and Mrs. C. W. Tracy of Springfield, Mass. A sister, Mrs. George Woodward of Putnam, also

survives, she being the only remaining member of Mr. Nichols' first wife's family.

Mr. Nichols' wife died in Williamstown in 1908. Two sons, Edward and William J. have died during the past few years. Mr. Nichols' celebrated his golden wedding anniversary November 8, 1901, at which time there were four generations present.

Miss LEON C. PINNEY. Manchester friends will be grieved to learn of the death of Julia Francis, wife of Leon C. Pinney, formerly of this town, who died at Dalton, Mass., on Friday, August 29th at 3 p. m., and was buried from her late home the following Sunday.

Death resulted from an attack of the grippe, followed by pleurisy and a complication of these ailments. She was 62 years of age.

She was born in Pittsfield in 1874 and came here in 1897 when her husband and his sister, Frank opened the American Laundry on Charter Oak street and remained here until 1907 when they returned to Dalton to continue the laundry business which they had disposed of when they came to South Manchester.

WHAT, WHEN AND HOW TO EAT

How Obesity is Caused and How Diet Will Effect a Cure.

By EUGENE CHRISTIAN, F. S. D.

Obesity or overweight is a disease produced by a definite cause, for which there is a definite remedy. There may be a slight hereditary tendency toward obesity, but it is usually caused directly by violating one or more of nature's laws. If the cause is hereditary, the science of nutrition is doing but little for the human family if it cannot overcome this.

A combination of commissions and omissions generally conspire to produce the obese body. They may be mentioned in the order of their importance: First—Overeating. Second—Omission of the proper amount of exercise. Third—The overconsumption of food, especially meat and fermented stimulants.

The worst form of obesity is that caused by overconsumption of stimulants, which, when taken in large doses, contributes not only to the obesity, but also to the degeneration of the body. In fact, all forms of obesity are not only unwholesome, but dangerous to life. The obese body is much more liable to contagious and infectious diseases, and when once affected, it is very difficult to free itself from the normal body.

The following is a list taken from the diet book standard, which shows the normal weight of naturally healthy adults according to height, also the weight considered obese:

The foods most conducive to obesity are carbohydrates, such as starch, sugar, alcohol, and the very soluble fats. Carbohydrates are the principal fat-making nutrients and might be grouped as follows:

While the above named articles are all conducive to the production of fat in the body, it does not mean that they should be totally eliminated, but rather that the quantity should be reduced to the actual needs of the body. As an example, the old method of treating diabetes was to limit starch and sugar entirely. Modern science has shown this method to be incorrect.
