DOES MANCHESTER NEED the SALOON FOR REVENUE?

Who Pays the License Fees? 12 Saloons in Manchester pay us \$450 each or a total of \$5400. What does the town give the saloon? The people of Manchester pay the license fees in order that the saloons may pay back to the town \$ 5,400. The average saloon keeper must in addition to his license fees receive at least \$2,000 for his expenses of help, rent, other expenses, and private profit. The people of Manchester pay this 24,000. Allowing the saloon keeper a profit of 50 per cent on the liquor sold, their expenses for liquor would be as much as the two items above or 29,400. TOTAL \$58,800. So a conservative estimate is that The Town's People Each Year Pay Into Our Saloons \$58,800 at Least and Perhaps a Good Deal More. If we receive in return \$5,400, 5 per cent of which must be paid to the state, We Are Paying Out \$11 For Each Dollar Returned to the Town. IS THIS GOOD BUSINESS? By the above figures, which are conservative, the average amount paid into the saloon by each man, woman and child in Manchester is \$4.47. The average amount received in license is 39c. Is this good business? The people of Manchester pay into the saloons half as much (perhaps altogether as much) as the total town taxes. The people who can least afford it pay out this money, leaving many bills of legitimate business unpaid and many home necessities unprovided for.
