Ground grain is better for feeding both young and old ducks.

Do not breed the young sow until she is nine months old and keep her breeding regularly two litters a year until she begins to decline from old age or is proved a poor brood sow.

Red raspberries are propagated by runners which come up during the winter and then are cut out in the spring. These runners are taken up and planted in the next spring.

Fresh eggs laid freely by hens and covered with a layer of straw, will keep for a long time. Spilled eggs go to the farmers. Contaminated eggs, though not so good as fresh ones, are still good for eating. Cooked eggs are better than the spoiled ones, when the latter are well washed and eaten.

Just as long as you have a heart and a head, it is better to be a farmer than a laborer. Poor indeed is that man or woman who in this life can find nothing for which she can be glad.

Keep Selecting the Best Eggs.

Constant selection is the only way to get your flock up to a grade you want it. When you see a good one, look carefully and note well her characteristics. Put her in a breeding pen and use her as a breeder another year. Do this throughout the summer and when fall comes you will have a flock of the best birds and a breeding pen of the best you have.

Build Up Utility.

There is only one way to build up the utility of a flock and that is by constant selection. A temporary feather is saved only the eggs from the very best layers for hatching purposes, each generation will become a better one. This work can be greatly assisted by obtaining males from a heavy laying strain.

Tainted Food Dangerous.

Letting a hen eat tainted food is a serious business this time of year.

Experiments have proved that a hen in good condition will eat, on an average, three ounces of mash in the morning, two ounces of grain at noon, and four ounces of grain at night.

The laying hen is not apt to become overfat. Nevertheless, it is a mistake to keep her on a diet of corn except in the winter months, but the best article. Corn is so good food.

Pigs should not be fed on the ground in a yard or pen where their own excrement abounds. Changing from place to place in the pasture does very well in summer, but in winter a good feeding floor should be provided.

TO APPLY TUBERCULIN TEST

Has No Ill Effect Whatever on Healthy Cows and Does No Harm to Those Afflicted.

If a tuberculous cow has a small quantity of tuberculin introduced beneath the skin, it will cause a temporary fever, which can be detected by taking the temperature of the animal—a healthy animal shows no such reaction. Tuberculin has no ill effect, whatever, on healthy animals, and no harmful effect on tuberculous animals. It does not, in the amounts used in testing, have any effect on the progress of the disease in the animal, nor can it in any way produce the disease. Regularly for 10 to 15 years with absolutely no injurious effects. The statements that the test causes abortion or other ailments are without foundation. The flow of milk is not changed in any appreciable extent, even in the case of tubercular animals.

The temperature of cattle, unlike that of man, varies widely, not only in different animals, but in the same animal at different times. Usually the normal of a cow is usually between 101-102 degrees F.; that of calves and of fat stock somewhat higher, while old cows and thin animals, or those that show somewhat lower temperatures.

By means of a hypodermic syringe, the tuberculin is injected beneath the skin of the animal. The tuberculin is injected being just back on the hump of the shoulder. This places the needle in the subcutaneous tissue. The injection may be made on the side toward the operator, or on the other side or rearward, as the operator of the animal. Thanksgiving: The act of rendering thanks, expressing gratitude for favors or mercies; a public celebration of divine goodness. Thanksgiving day: A day set apart for religious services in acknowledgment of the divine goodness.

COMPLEXITIES IN COLLECTION OF INCOME TAX MADE CLEAR

Questions About New Law's Meaning Answered by Legal Expert.

It has been estimated that the income tax law will directly affect more than half a million citizens and aliens. Probably millions will be indirectly affected in one way or another by the provisions of the law for payment of the tax "at the source."

Preliminary Questions.
Q.—When was this law passed?
A.—Oct. 3, 1913, and went into effect on Oct. 1, 1913.

Rates of Taxation.
Q.—What is the rate of taxation?
A.—The normal rate is 1 per cent of the net income or gross income, whichever is the greater.

Exemptions and Deductions.
Q.—Is there any exemption allowed to a taxpayer?
A.—Yes, \$2,000; and if the taxpayer is married, \$4,000.

Individuals Subject to the Tax.
Q.—What persons are subject to the tax?
A.—Every citizen of the United States who is taxable upon his entire net income.

Corporations Subject to the Tax.
Q.—What corporations are subject to the tax?
A.—Every corporation, joint stock company or association, every partnership, and every individual who is taxable upon his entire net income.

Tax Returns.
Q.—What individuals are required to make tax returns?
A.—Every individual who is taxable upon his entire net income.
