It says in part: buring the past few years there has een a marked change in the methods. Espraying apple trees, the most important being a quite general atheti-tation of lime-sulphur for bordeaus mixture as a fungicide. There is prob-ably no better material than bordeaus mixture in use today for the control of apple scab, but unfortunately it is frequently the cause of serious damage to both follage and fruit if the reather conditions are right. The circular gives a list of a large number of varieties of apples with the relative resistance of each to this spray. It is not recommended that orchardists who have been using bordeaux mix-ture successfully on resistant varieties. change to lime-sulphur. On the other hand, those who have experienced any difficulty with it, or who are grawing varieties known to be susceptible to
