Proposed Addition To Lincoln School To Cost Forty-Five Thousand Dollars. No Quibbling About Securing Best To Be Had. Playground There

The special school meeting of the Ninth district called last Monday evening lasted but fifteen minutes and in that time the voters authorized an additional appropriation of \$10,000 for the construction of the addition to the Lincoln school at the Center.

The meeting was called to order at eight o'clock by Howell Cheney, chairman of the Ninth district school board and he was chosen chairman. There were about forty voters present at the meeting. After the call had been read by Clerk Charles R. Hathaway, Chairman Chency explained what the building committee was up against. The district had appropriated \$35,000. for the addition, and the committee at that time thought that sum sufficient. Bids had been received on the plans and the lowest bidder's figures, including the cost of heating and plumbing,

was \$37,604 The committee had made a careful estimate of other necessary expenses which brought the total up considerably. The cost of furnishing nine rooms would be \$2,250; grading would be \$150; wiring \$350; clocks \$150; automatic sprinklers \$360; architect's commission \$2,400; and an extension to the vacuum cleaning system and a fire alarm system would boost the figures another thousand dollars making the
