INSOLVENT WEST SIDE SCHOOL

ESTATE OF LATE FRANK GOETZ SO DECLARED BY PROBATE COURT

Banks Have Claims Amounting To \$30,000—Estate of Notes for Large Amounts Disclosed—Hearing Next Tuesday—Bakery Properties Not Involved

At a hearing before Judge Gilson of the probate court today, on the accounting of William H. Hill, a former well known druggist of this city, as administrator on the estate of the late Frank Goetz, who founded and conducted a large bakery concern in State street the surprising information was given the court that the estate is insolvent.

The account discloses that Mr. Goetz estate is valued at \$5,809.26, all in cash and stock in part follows: against the estate total \$48,756.56 a very large percentage of which were presented by banks of this city.

Mr. Goetz died about two years ago and Mr. Hill was made administrator on the estate. Since that time Mr. Hill had not filed an accounting. A short time ago application was brought to the court asking for an accounting and the court directed that one be filed and this was done today.

It was expected that the estate would be solvent in view of the fact that Mr. Goetz was believed to be the principal owner of the bakery company which bears his name, but consideration this morning the small total value of the estate was made apparent.

The statement of assets shows that Mr. Goetz received but \$84 for 120 shares of the bakery before referred to.

The claims presented on personal notes of Mr. Goetz in part follow: Yale National bank, \$500; S. H. Reed, \$1,500; Thomas A. Berry, \$500; Mechanics bank, \$3,000; Merchants bank, \$12,250; New Britain Trust Company, \$1,000; and other minor claims, making a total of \$20,244.51.

The following claims were filed against the estate as the deceased was the endorser on notes which have been protested: Merchants bank, \$6,312.05; Yale National bank, \$15,000; Mechanics bank, \$7,190, making a total of \$28,502.05, Register, New Haven, February 17, 1914.

It should be stated in this relation that the above does not in any way involve the Frank Goetz Bakery Company, New Haven, nor the Goetz Bread Company of this place, both of which concerns are doing a large and constantly enlarging business.

William H. Hill is the manager of the Frank Goetz Bakery Company and Fritz Mohr of the Goetz Bread Company, Mr. Frank Goetz, in a financial interest in either of these properties.

It may be of interest to many of the younger generation hereabouts to learn that the bakery business was started by the late Frank Goetz in the premises now occupied by the News, that subsequently it was transferred to Manchester, where it met with disastrous fires but rose triumphant over all and steadily enlarged. That Mr. Goetz sold the Manchester bakery to a joint stock company, which William H. Hill is the principal owner and present manager—Ed. News.

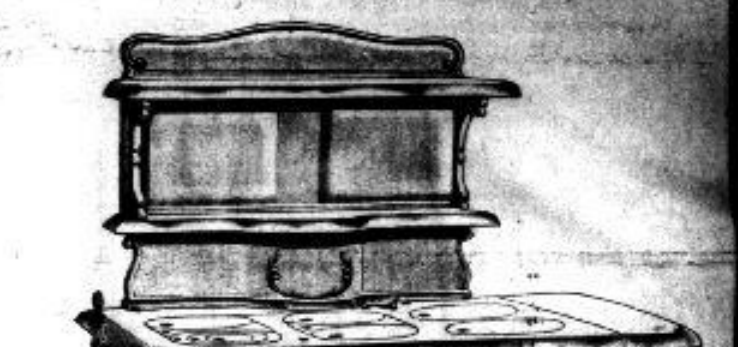
