**METHODIST CONFERENCE**

**SOUTHERN NEW ENGLAND WILL CONVENE IN WILLIMANTIC TUESDAY**

Outline Business To Be Transacted and List of Principal Distinguished Speakers, Pastors of Both Local Churches Expect To Be Returned.

The 74th annual Southern New England Conference will convene at Willimantic next Tuesday and will continue in session until March 30. Rev. S. E. Ellis and Deaconess Miss Hall will represent the South M. E. Church and Rev. C. H. Mosher will represent the North M. E. church. It is expected that a number of the local Methodists will attend the conference during the week.

Bishop John W. Hamilton of Boston, Mass., resident bishop of New England will preside at the business sessions of the conference. There will be upwards of 200 ministers present besides secretaries and deacons. Rev. W. O. Nuzum, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church of Willimantic has arranged for the entertainment of the visitors in the Thread City during the week.

The business session will be held each morning starting at 8:30 o'clock and continuing until 12:00 o'clock. There will be interesting addresses Thursday afternoon at 2 and 4 o'clock and also each evening at 7:30 o'clock. Bishop Anderson will speak Thursday at 4 and again at 7 o'clock.

Friday will be "The Great Day of the Feast." It is known as "Efficiency Day." Besides special speakers at the morning session The Laymen's Association will meet at one o'clock and the Women's Missionary Society will convene at 2 and 3 o'clock. Bishop Hamilton will deliver an address Friday evening talking for his subject "The Mexican Crisis."
