METHODIST CONFERENCE

SOUTHERN NEW ENGLAND WILL CONVENE IN WILLIMANTIC TUESDAY

Outline Business To Be Transacted and List of Principal Distinguished Speakers, Pastors of Both Local Churches Expect To Be Returned.

The 74th annual Southern New England Conference will convene at Willimantic next Tuesday and will continue in session until March 30. Rev. S. E. Ellis and Deaconess Miss Hall will represent the South M. E. Church and Rev. C. H. Mosher will represent the North M. E. church. It is expected that a number of the local Methodists will attend the conference during the week.

Bishop John W. Hamilton of Boston, Mass., resident bishop of New England will preside at the business sessions of the conference. There will be upwards of 200 ministers present besides secretaries and deacons. Rev. W. O. Nuzum, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church of Willimantic has arranged for the entertainment of the visitors in the Thread City during the week.

The business session will be held each morning starting at 8:30 o'clock and continuing until 12:00 o'clock. There will be interesting addresses each afternoon at 2 and 4 o'clock and also each evening at 7:30 o'clock. Bishop Anderson will speak Thursday at 4 and again at 7 o'clock.

Friday will be "The Great Day of the Feast." It is known as "Efficiency Day." Besides special speakers at the morning session The Laymen's Association will meet at one o'clock and the Women's Missionary Society will convene at 2 and 3 o'clock. Bishop Hamilton will deliver an address Friday evening talking for his subject "The Mexican Crisis."

Saturday afternoon the Epworth League anniversary will be celebrated and Rev. Wilbur F. Sheridan of Chicago, Ill., general secretary of the Epworth League will be heard. It will be the first time for Rev. Mr. Sheridan to address a New England audience.

On Sunday, March 29, the services will be held at the Loomer Opera House. There will be a love feast at 10 o'clock and at 10:30 Bishop Hamilton will deliver an address. At two o'clock in the afternoon there will be confirmation of deacons and elders and consecration of deacons. At 6 o'clock an Epworth League meeting will be held by Rev. G. E. Mosman of Taunton, Mass., conference president of the Epworth League. Rev. J. I. Bartholomew, D. D. of New Bedford, Mass., and army pastor of the local South M. E. church will deliver an address at the evening meeting. There will also be an exhortation by Bishop Hamilton.

It is expected that Rev. Mr. Ellis and Rev. Mr. Mosher will be returned to the local churches, as their churches have requested that such action be taken by the conference.

Rev. Mr. Ellis will be busy with committee work during the week, being a member of the committee on conference rules and also a member of the committee to consider a new plan for the entertainment of the annual conference. A movement is on foot to have the entertainment of conference members while attending conference paid for instead of being entertained at private homes as is now the custom.

Rev. Mr. Ellis is one of the conference historians.

The board of selectmen held an hours session last evening at the town hall to act on some urgent executive business. The entire board was present but owing to the fact Selectman Cheney had to leave early and also Selectmen Hohenholtz and Cairns had another engagement there were but few matters considered.

It was brought to the board's attention that the lighting company has not installed lights in several places about town where they have been ordered installed and order the company to install the lights forthwith. It was voted to hold another special meeting next Thursday evening.
