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SEEDS IN APRIL

Plant Only Real Live Ones and Keep Them Growing.

Good seeds to grow should be pure of free from other kinds of seeds, be true to name and possess the greatest possible vigor. Testing seeds in a reliable way is not only interesting, but few have the time to do it, and therefore we should use reliable seeds from the reliable seed houses. Corn, however, should be tested in order to avoid loss from low vitality and seeds having to be re-sown. Testing seeds is a simple matter, and many use the post-harvest filter out of eggs to do it. These being filled with damp sand, then a kernel of corn is placed in each and covered with sand. Forward being worked thoroughly with lukewarm water; a piece of damp cotton cloth is then laid over the tester until the seeds sprout, which is in about five days. If the seed is good about 80 per cent should germinate.

CONSERVATION OF SOIL MOISTURE

Preventing Drought by Cultivation. W. H. STEVENSON.

From 275 to 300 tons of water are required to produce one ton of dry matter for most of our common farm crops. In many portions of the United States the rainfall during the growing season is not sufficient to supply these large amounts of water to the crops. This fact lays stress upon two things—namely, the importance of large water supplies in the soil and of a greater water, but as capillary water, which is for the most part available for growing plants, and also the importance of the conservation of this soil water.

PLANTING TREES TOO CLOSE

Mistake That Too Frequently Makes the Appearance of Streets of American Cities.

The close setting of trees is largely responsible for the deformed arched growth we now have in our cities. We occasionally see rows of trees that have become hedged forty and fifty feet high with numerous dead branches and dead trunks and whole dead trees here and there, though nearly all examples are in rural districts. Out in the open we see trees growing so close together that no one of them has a good form. Each is struggling to get out into the light. It is the hardest thing in the world to induce men to look forward for twenty-five years and take the growth of trees into consideration.

Said one man to the writer: "Well, I want something that will look well in my lifetime. When I am gone it doesn't matter to me how the trees look. They will not get too large in my lifetime with each other in my lifetime."

This, we must concede, is not the right spirit to control the tree planting. It is more than mere planting for the future. Perhaps some of our forefathers reasoned that way fifty years ago, and as a result we have a mass of deformed trees now, many of them fit only to be grubbed out and cast into the fire. When we are planting trees there is no reason why the planting should not be done in a manner that will give us satisfaction now and those that come after us in the future years. Besides, even in our lifetime a symmetrical tree with sunshades all around it is perhaps as beautiful as the tree whose branches mingle with those of adjoining trees.

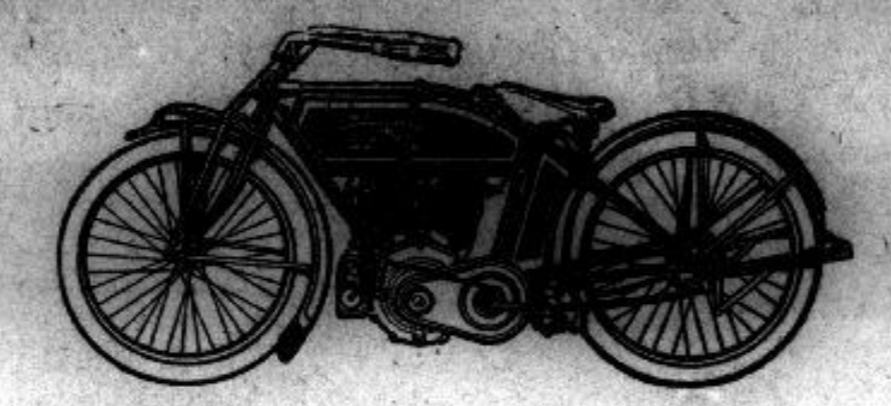
