TALK ON TAXATION

AT CAPITOL IN HARTFORD
BY CHARLES CHENY: Y
OF THIS PLACE

Large Subject Handled in Clear, Straightforward and Informing Manner—Many Dark Places in Tax Problem Illuminated—Underlying Principles Explained

At a recent meeting of the Connecticut Tax Officials Association in the Capitol at Hartford, Charles Cheny of this place was the subject of taxation in a very clear, straightforward and convincing manner. We take pleasure in presenting to our readers this discourse and believe it is a careful study. We do not attempt any theory of preservation. Mr. Cheny can start on this short talk.

by taking the position that the manufacturers of the state of Connecticut should cheerfully pay their full proportionate share of the total amount of the tax raised, there several reasons why we see little for the old argument that since it is the manufacturer who gives the industry to the town and thereby contributes to its prosperity and growth, he should be freed and left off bearing his share of the tax. There is no particular reason to believe that the manufacturer should not be discriminated against, but he should be put upon a basis of equality with all others.

It has been a common practice to offer all sorts of inducements to new companies to locate in their localities and among the most notable of these held out has been the abatement of taxes for a term of years. There are some good arguments in favor of this plan, but there is also a strong case to be made out in favor of it. It is really just comparative valuation if we are to adopt a value basis than if we adopt a lesser percentage to work on. Our state law provides that property should be listed at "actual value," which is defined to mean "fair

market value"; and, if we take this at face value, it will be paid as far as for any of the other factors which contribute to the success of his enterprise. Now if the factor is to pay its fair proportion of the tax, he should do it at a rate which is not too high, but which is not so high as to make it a disadvantage as compared to our neighbors, but we have no legal remedy, as we are not overtaxed according to the law. Even if it is not a question of seeking legal redress, I believe it is much easier to cover up irregularities on some fictitious basis than it is on a basis of actual value. I believe that when all values quoted are at variance with the known facts, it is much more likely that errors will pass unnoticed.

On buildings we deduct 10 per cent, as we consider that in spite of the fact that replacement will keep up the value depreciated by age, it is not true that the value of the stocks is not excessive, and the trouble comes when we try to find what it cost to replace them. It should also be noted that the insurance value does not include the foundations.

On machinery the deduction is placed at 25 per cent., and I think that used machinery is certainly worth less than the new, as it would cost to replace it with new. You will note that this does not seek to put an auction value upon it.

I am not sure that we can get at its "actual value."

In valuing the stocks of raw materials, we do in process and finished, we have a complicated problem which we solve in a rough way by making a deduction of those officials, but it is simple enough to drop it in the work properly because they haven't the necessary data, machinery and time to arrive at anything like a fair estimate of the valuation of a manufacturing plant. A previous statement has just said that fix the value of a manufacturing plant next to an impossible possibility, but to fix the valuation approximately is within the range of hope.

I think this is clearly illustrated by the fact that we do in fact have to fall back upon such basis of valuation in the case of adjusting insurance losses, and I have been very much surprised to find out how accurately insurance engineers of the factory mutual companies have worked up a system of adjustment of insurance value of machinery, vessels, etc.

When you propose to know what the cost of insurance is, and the attempt to lay down fixed rates and definitions which will pretty surely fail to work. Let us stick to the simple rule of "actual value" and I believe that we shall not get very grievously astray in the vast majority of cases.

Goods in process and finished are made on a gamble, as we can never know what the market value is going to want six months from now, and we would not care what the taxes were if we did not pay them. We, therefore, feel justified in making a considerable deduction on account of hazard of the stock as well as for the expected (but not necessarily) loss, and have been already stated, deducting from the net upon the same basis as all other similar property in the town,

which are sure to be peculiar to the particular property in question, and for this reason we do not make any attempt to lay down fixed rates and definitions which will pretty surely fail to work. 

WHY CAPT. SCOTT LOST HIS LIFE

Queer Things That Turn Up in the News

Commander Evans Gives New Facts For First Time.

OIL SHORTAGE WAS TRAGIC.

Antarctic Explorer's Companion Says Their Leader Would Have Had to Suffer Amputation of His Legs Even Had He Been Able to Reach One Ton Camp, the Base of Supplies.

Commander E. G. R. Evans of the Royal Navy, second in command of the Scott expedition to the antarctic and the last member of the supporting party to see Captain Scott alive, has made public some details of his expedition which he has omitted in his lectures or written accounts. These are given in the New York Post.

Even had Captain Scott succeeded in reaching One Ton camp, the base of supplies, it would have been necessary to amputate one leg and his companion Evans. The fate of the expedition, according to the commander, was to some extent due to unavoidable shortage of oil supply—"paradoxically," he says, "as the supply of the explorers came in the surplus of the return." The oil plant at the center of the Scott expedition was the first to fail, and it was planted early in the fall and began to grow immediately. Owing to the lack of sunlight, it is a whitish skin.

IMPROVES RADIUM AND METHODS OF USING IT.

Applicators Seven Times More Powerful Than Best Used in Europe.

The radium applicators have had more heat and liquid applied to them by Evans, "they could have kept their limbs from being frozen. The shortage of paraffin oil was tragic. But for that reason, Captain Scott's legs were not cut off, though they were frozen through. It is simply a question of hot fuel and energy, without which the human engine can fight against the cold."

As it was, the condition of Captain Scott's legs would have called for amputation, even if he could have fought through to One Ton camp. The doctor who examined him at the time the bodies were found died months later.

"Of course the atrocious weather was a factor that could not be helped. No one was prepared for it so thoroughly planned. And yet there seems, inasmuch as to have been too little allowance for the amount of fuel and the like, the 'Miranda' Captain Scott had marching through. It was a fine weather supply at many points. The oil which we had had to burn for fuel for making fire and smoke must have leaked through the stoppers. In many instances two gallons had dwindled to a gallon in two-thirds."

Major General and Sir Edward of the Royal navy volunteer, one of the ship's party on the Terra Nova, told many interesting details of the Scott expedition. "The 'Terra Nova' is still in the Antarctic. It was his belief that when a man's trunks got loose he had to take himself out of the way."

Captain Scott was the man who walked out of the earth on March 17. When he fell he had been keeping others busy and as he lay in the snow he told the blizzard, "I am just going outside."

"That was always Captain Scott's idea. He was always trying to encourage others that he was not alone in the blizzard. 'I am just going outside.'

It was a sad day for the Antarctic. All the men were gathered around the camp at the Cape Evans base during the winter of 1911. Sealed up in their tents, the party of 28 had to wait until April 10 for the return of the supply ship. It was his belief that when a man's trunks got loose he had to take himself out of the way."

One Week Ago This Escaped.

"Each of the three supporting parties reported shortage of oil," said Major General. "Dr. Atkinson, Commander Evans, who only had two men with him, had to leave the ship to get the transports and animals all told the same story. Each supporting party that picked up the depots of the return trip had to leave the ship with the oil cans, but Major General had to share and traveled on two nests a day."

"It was a combination of great luck and determination that brought Commander Evans home alive. He started by going right through blizzards, walking two days across the ice to get to the hut where the glacier had to be cut through to get to the upper glacier deposit. Two days later he had to walk through the blizzard which lasted for three days, then he had to go back to the hut where the tracks of the dogs had to be skinned. He got the direction of the glacier and steered a safe course by exposing his right hand and telling the feel of the water. When he got to the hut he had to go through the blizzard and in consequence had to toboggan down. Shackleton's ice falls to get back to the upper glacier deposit.
