ganized Ball" Teams. Three radical changes have been made in the playing rules that will govern baseball wherever it is played. The Federal league is expected to abide by the changes just the same as the so-called "organized baseball" teams. Probably the most important change is the one that will prevent the coacher at third base from stopping or holding up a runner. If the coacher puts his hands on the runner the latter is out.
