Wesley Hollister. Wesley Hollister was found dead at his home on Spencer street last Saturday at August 5, an employee. Medical Examiner Dr. W. R. Tinker named acute alcoholism as the cause of death. It is hoped that it will help to eliminate the dangerous condition at the Center when the Hartford and cross-town cars pass each other.

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FOR NEW CHURCH

Ground To Be Broken Next Sunday By Swedish Lutherans. The congregation of the Swedish Lutheran Church of South Manchester will celebrate the breaking of ground for the new church, next Sunday, May 10th at 3 p. m. A short address in Swedish will be made by Dr. Youngert of Hartford, and Professor Franzen from the Hartford High School will make an address in English. Dr. Ohman, President of the New England Conference is also expected to attend. The musical selections will be rendered by the Church Choir and the Children's Chorus. A free will offering will be taken. Refreshments will be served by the Ladies Aid Society.

**An Open Letter to the Clergy**

Rev. Gentlemen: On one of these pages of last week's News, you saw illustrations of Vera Cruz showing some of the dead victims of war. When studying these pictures myself, my mind began to wander. Once more, I was a boy at Sunday school learning christian doctrine and breathing "Peace, good will to all men." You taught me that christianity is the religion of our Lord Christ, the "Prince of Peace." As a boy, I reasoned like a boy and believed all that you taught, but since I reached the age of manhood, I try to reason like a man. Will you stop a moment and reason with me? You have for nearly two thousand years held control of the vast portion of the human race in your hands. Have you taught peace—effectively? If so, how then is christianity still in "war"? Why does organized christianity today divest herself of her robe of righteousness and her garments of meek humility to clothe herself in "shirts"? Do you claim that it is impossible for you to prevent war because you lack power? If so, may I ask you and what has taken your power? Was it mammon? Is it impossible for you to get christianity to obey Christ? How many sermons of protest against war have you delivered? Have you ever protested against the building of battleships, forts, cannons, etc? Have you ever in any of your sermons pointed out to the young men of your parish that war is a relic of barbarism, therefore contrary to the true spirit of Christ? If not, why not? Will any of you Reverend gentlemen explain how it can be possible for a christian to take part in any war, doing the work of the Devil, then fall in his hands and ask the Almighty God to help him? It seems incredible that any representative of the "Prince of Peace" could boss war banners and lead his army before and into the battle. It does seem to me that such a prayer is an abomination to the Lord. In my estimation, a prayer before battle is more blasphemous than downright swearing. To pray and ask God to be with us, to give us strength to help us in the wholesale murdering and butchering of our fellowmen, is unchristian and rank paganism. #### UNPRODUCTIVE BLACK SOILS

Unproductive black soils are of swampy origin and must have an adequate system of drainage before permanent improvement can be obtained.

Each post and unproductive black or peaty sand soils are more often deficient in potash than any other element and potash can be easily applied to a decided advantage.

Some black soils are found to be more or less acid. Where there is a decided acidity, lime is a basic line, such as pulverized limestone, should be applied. The soil should be tested for acidity and if it is almost always needed in addition to limestone. Potash is essential, secondary need on such soils.

It is not necessary as a fertilizer to use potash on such soils, even in a few cases. Potash and phosphate are the two elements which are most needed on such soils and gravelly gravel, etc., so they need not be afraid of using potash and phosphate of mineral fertilizers.

In a large house the best practice is to put the little pig in a pen in the kitchen and cover the box with clean straw and cover the box with a blanket. Little pigs should be in the box for 24 hours, taking them out for a short time every two hours to exercise.

A sow should be kept quiet and fed little. At all during the first 24 hours after farrowing, she may be given a drink of water, followed by a light bran mash. The feed is then gradually increased up to the tenth day when a full ration may be fed. By this time the milk will be in the udder and secure in the pig as protected.

#### TROUGH FOR GREEDY HORSES

When Animal Does Not Grind Its Feed, It Arranged Like Illustration.

To prevent the greedy animal from eating so fast that it does not grind its grain well, the feed box may be arranged like the one shown here. The box is built on both sides of the partition with only a narrow opening at the bottom. The feed is put into the outside half of the box and slowly through the small opening slowly, says the Wisconsin Agricultural Experiment Station. This method is thus fed more economically and to greater advantage, as it cannot be bolted quickly by the hungry animal. A side on the outside can easily be arranged to regulate the size of the opening through which the grain passes to the inner feed box.
