LETTER ADDRESSED TO CONNECTICUT COMPANY BY SELECTMEN

Secretary Hohenthal Resents Inauguration Made Last Evening By Judge Arnott at Town Meeting—Nothing To Conceal Letter is Public Property

May Twenty-Ninth, 1914

Editor of The News—

My attention has been called to certain remarks of Judge Arnott in the Town Meeting, which escaped my hearing, in some instances, in which he seemed to be well advised to bring a certain letter in the correspondence between myself as secretary of the Board of Selectmen.

As this letter is part of the records of the Selectmen and had been recorded in full, previous to last night's meeting, in the minutes of the board which are open to the inspection of any citizen, I fail to see any ground for Judge Arnott's statement.

It was my intention to bring with me this letter as correspondence I had with the Connecticut Company, and I was greatly chagrined to find one letter missing from my package.

In order that the voters present last night may know the contents of the letter, will you please (though I know it is asking rather more than I ought to expect) publish the letter in your issue of to-day as a part of the report of the meeting?

### Irish Contingent Favor Union Band for Homestead Day

There will be a meeting this evening of the committee having in charge the plan for the proposed participation of the Irish contingent in the Homestead Day parade and exercises generally when definite action will be taken as to whether that body shall take part in the proceedings or whether they shall withdraw entirely from the field and return to the country. The committee will be held by the committee and by those of their appointment for this purpose.

### WATKINS BROTHERS

Under date of April 30th you wrote the Board of Selectmen regarding their order for the relocation of the Main street trolley tracks in South Manchester, and that Mr. Bristol would call and explain regarding the company's position. By mutual agreement the number of the Selectmen met Mr. Bristol in his office in Hartford on May 2nd, and gave him to understand very emphatically that the Board of Selectmen had reached the stage where they did not intend to have these Main street improvements which involve concrete pavements, sewers, electric lights and other public utilities, delayed by your company whose tracks must be moved before the most of these other improvements can be installed.

At his urgent solicitation we tentatively assented to give him an opportunity to present our views and statement to his superiors, with the understanding that we should have a definite answer reply no later than a week from the following Monday which was May 9th. No written statement came from you or your office to the Board, and as we were just proceeding to take action on this important matter, Mr. Bristol called up the selectmen at their office while in session and stated that you intended to proceed with the work, but asked the Board to be as lenient with the company as possible, and gave us the assurance that the work would be started no later than the 1st of July and as much earlier as it possibly could be done.

We were also informed that undoubtedly we would receive confirmation of this telephone statement from headquarters in New Haven. This information was conveyed to the Board of Selectmen. They assuming that the communication mentioned would come the following day, directed me to notify Mr. Bristol, as given in copy of the letter enclosed herewith. No confirmation has come and I am directed to inform you now that the Board of Selectmen will meet on Friday, May 15th at half past two o'clock, for the purpose of formulating the necessary legal procedure to enforce their order with regard to the improvement mentioned above.

Our patience has been exhausted by the dilatoriness with which this matter has been handled, and with the utter disregard of our order and the indefiniteness of the Company's reply as to when this work is to be undertaken. Any reply that you intend to make by correspondence or by representative in this matter, must be in the hands of the Board of Selectmen previous to the proposed participation of the Board on Friday night, May 15th, at 7:30 o'clock, and must be in writing. Verbal communications and statements will not be acceptable. Communications should be signed by you and not a subordinate officer.

COL ROOSEVELT'S STORY OF HIS LAST GREAT ADVENTURE

Queer Animals Described by Returned Explorer of the Brazilian Wilds.

Trouble Little Peccaries, Wasps that Prey and Formidable Spiders.

WITH the return of Colonel Roosevelt after seven months spent in the wilds of South America public interest in the former president is divided between the stories of the thrilling adventures he encountered and his future political activities.

But the journey will be better. "I can't do it," was the undaunted reply. "I'll go as far as I can, and when I am unable to proceed further I'll stay right there and fight it out alone."
