Tax Collector George J. Howe is sending out bills for personal taxes and persons failing to respond with payment of same are apt to encounter legal difficulties. The personal tax is but \$2.00 a year for each taxpayer. It is the purpose of Mr. Howe to turn over to an officer of the law the list of delinquents and let that officer take such legal steps for collection as may be found necessary. Up to the present time there has been no interest added upon the delinquent bills for this year. The added rate is nine per centum, which makes the bill \$2.19 if allowed to go unpaid for one year. Should legal proceedings become necessary to make the collector's total collection per head would approximate \$12.00. It should require no argument to convince anyone that it is far more preferable and convenient to pay the \$2.00 rather than incur the legal expenses indicated above.

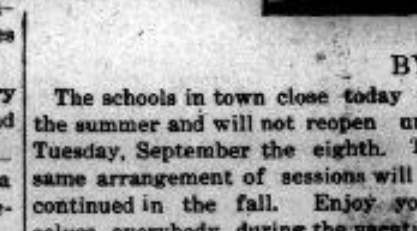

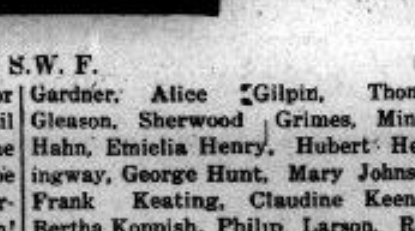
