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WHAT WHEN AND HOW TO EAT

The Cause of About 90 Per Cent of Our Ills.

EXPERIENCE of physicians, nurses and mothers shows that a great majority of human ills are caused by wrong eating.

Just what per cent of disease is due to the stomach has never been definitely ascertained, but it is estimated that about 90 per cent of all disease originates in the stomach and is caused by wrong eating and drinking.

We find a tremendous mortality among infants and children up to six years of age. After this period has passed statistics show that people are fairly healthy until their health begins to decline after the age of thirty.

The following is a spring and summer menu designed for the average business man who does considerable thinking and takes little exercise:

Two or three cups of white wheat porridge or codded. A spoonful of rice or whole wheat macaroni with thoroughly cooked preferably one or two large red bananas (dead ripe), eaten with milk or buttermilk.

Both tea and coffee should be omitted. A cup of hot water with lemon juice with each meal. If there is no tendency toward fermentation, intestinal gas or sour stomach the juice of an orange very ripe, plain or with a little sugar may be taken just before breakfast, but never with the luncheon or evening meal.

NOTES FROM MEADOWBROOK FARM

Keep a record of the cows. Deep plowing stirs the rain. Where is your farm machinery? The dry pasture calls for a rolling crop.

Keep the hog sheds dry. Fresh eggs are in demand. A mottling hen does hard work. Plovers are said to be the hardest work known.

It is best to have a hot knife to cut cold, thick honeycomb. The heaviest frosts are, as a rule, found on medium-sized sheep.

To keep a cow clean the stall in which she stands must not be too wide. A drum doesn't cost much and saves lots of fuel.

There is just as much importance in storing vegetables or apples out of doors as it is better to dig a trench. Pile on top of the ground and cover.

Plenty of yellow corn, whole or cracked, will do a great deal toward fattening the Thanksgiving poultry. The coop for hen and chicks should be well ventilated, easy to clean and of sufficient proportion to house comfort.

It is claimed that exposed manure loses about one-third of its phosphoric acid, and more than one-third of its nitrogen.

Lamb make a greater gain in feeding than old sheep. It is therefore better for the farmer that good second-growth clover.

Carrots should be carefully picked and sent to market in attractive condition. It will not obtain the best prices.

Turkeys should always be fed plucked, for scalded ones do not present an attractive appearance and are not so well sold for.

Carrots should not be left in the ground too long. If they are left too long they will become woody and their flavor is lost.

IMPORTANCE OF CLEANLINESS

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South Manchester News

BIG VICTORY IS CLAIMED BY BELGIANS. Thousand Germans Killed and Wounded at Haelen. CONFLICT RAGES FOR TWO DAYS.

Invaders Number About Ten Thousand, According to Report From Brussels, White Defenders Have Seven Thousand Fighters—Germans Retire in Great Disorder After Being Completely Defeated—Victims of Hall of Metal Thickly Strewn About Fire Zone—Paris Dispatches Record Great French Victory on Franco-German Frontier—German Eviction of Fighting in Alsace to the Effect That French Were Beaten.

London, Aug. 14.—Two important actions are reported, one at Maastricht in Belgium, and the other at Pont-a-Mousson, north of Nancy, on the Franco-German frontier.

Of the same importance appears to be the fighting at Pont-a-Mousson where the French are said to have captured a number of prisoners and some guns. A German dispatch reports the capture of about 2000 French troops at Maastricht.

Many of the dispatches are received in London with considerable delay. Among these are stories that the German troops in Belgium are starving and that the German losses at Maastricht are up in the thousands—some estimates giving them as high as 10,000.

The battle of Haelen. The losses of the German troops at the battle of Haelen, near Hasselt, north of Liege, which raged Wednesday and Thursday, divided in each direction as the fighting raged.

In the early reports of the battle, the Germans were practically annihilated and the most conservative dispatches affirmed solemnly that the invaders had lost fully three-fifths of their numbers. The Belgian report that the Germans are about 1000 killed and wounded, and this report is from a Belgian source.

Another Belgian communication says: "The battle centered around Haelen, in the Belgian province of Limburg, extending from Duesin, in the north of the province of Brabant, after passing around Zeebrouck."

QUEEN WILHELMINA. Ruler of Holland Mobilizes Army to Resist an Invasion.

London, Aug. 14.—The queen of the Netherlands, Wilhelmina, has mobilized her army to resist an invasion. The queen is reported to have issued a decree ordering the mobilization of the army.
