"IRON RING" OF GERMANY CLOSING IN Germans Are Practically at Very Gates of Paris

STEADY ADVANCE UPON THE CAPITAL

Government Officials Hastily Leaving City When They Realize Nothing Can Stop German Rush—La Fere and Amiens in Hands of Invaders

Northwestern France a Land of Desolation—Endless Masses of Refugees and Huge Guns in Wake of Kaiser's Cavalry—Entrenchments Being Erected Between Forts Guarding Paris—Early Tidings of Disasters to Allies Nearly a Week Ago Are Pouring into London

London, Sept. 4.—The great German army that has been smashing its way through the lines of allies to the north of Paris has in less than two weeks to the forts that guard the French capital.

Already the guns that have been rumbled behind the cavalry and infantry are being set up in the favorable positions to batter the steel and concrete of the Paris forts just as they battered the strongholds of Amiens and Compiègne.

Everything heard in London bears out the assumption that the German advance upon Paris was not a mere bluff. It was a steady march that has been going on since the first of August.

Compiègne is but fifty miles distant from Paris. The Germans from the north have been pushing ahead through the ranks of the allies at the rate of less than a mile a day.

There is a young man for the exalted honor of the papacy, since he will be sixty years old on Nov. 21, 1914. The new wearer of the triple crown was born at Pegli, in the diocese of Genoa, in 1854 and was ordained to the priesthood in 1878.

The office of the rising ecclesiastical is by no means a "vacant" one. It is a surprise to some of the members of the church who did not know the reputation for high intellect and churchiness when on Dec. 16, 1907, the late Pope Pius X. appointed him to the important see of Bologna.

There is another interesting coincidence in the career of the two Bishops. The new pope and the former pope of the same name, Benedict XV, in the fact that they were both archbishops of Bologna.

Special School Meeting There will be a special meeting of the Ninth School District at the High School building next Thursday evening, September 10, to see if the district will authorize the school committee to borrow not to exceed \$100,000 during the school year 1914-1915.

All Paid Teachers and Double Sessions Every School Day. The fall term of the Ninth District schools will open next Wednesday morning at eight o'clock.

The board of selectmen met in special session at the hall of records last evening to prepare an estimate of the probable cost of conducting the town's business during the coming year.

Approximations A list of the estimated appropriations needed for the coming year follows, and it will be seen that there are many increases over last year's appropriations:

Estimates From this is to be deducted a balance on hand of \$8,500.00, and also estimated to be raised by taxation \$240,221.97 to be raised by taxation in order to raise this amount it is figured that a thirteen mill tax will be necessary, which will bring in \$239,318.13, about \$400 short.

Where Money Went In the charity department last year \$13,929.94 were expended and there were credits which brought the net expenditures down to \$16,298.44, which came within the appropriation for the year \$17,500. In the highway department the total orders drawn were \$43,534.13, from which is deducted credits of street lighting, sidewalk and curb work, leaving the net \$22,644.89 from which appropriation of \$33,000. Last year an appropriation of \$8,000 was made for the drainage of Main street and \$2,815.35 were expended. For the construction of the new bridge \$2,704.30 were appropriated, and it cost \$2,704.30 to build the bridge.
