



A general conscription was not car ried into effect until 1875, when gengoverning regulations were adopted as follows: All males at the age of twenty were subject to conscription; service with the standing army from twenty to twenty-two years; standing army reserve from twenty-three to twenty-six years; with the reserves rom twenty-seven to thirty-one years. The annual conscription gives about 250,000, many more than are required for the standing army. The usual exceptions are made for physical disabillity, for those supporting indigent! parents, for teachers, students, some of the professions, etc., and under the liberal construction of the regulations only 50,000 are called to the colors. Those selected are in the very best physical condition. In times of emergency not less than 150,000 could thus be called to the colors. At such times, too, it may be confidently expected that the conscripts will endeavor to conceal their physical defects rather than endeavor to take advantage of them for the purpose of evading service to their country. 



THE LICENSE QUESTION UP AGAIN REASONS WHY YOU SHOULD

VOTE LICENSE ON MONDAY

Past and only recent experience in towns, cities and states has proven that when a town or state has gone no-license, the commerce and prosperity diminishes rapidly. Many stores become vacant and numbers of men upon whom depend the livelihood of their families are thrown out of employment. The town loses the regular license revenues which help to pay the cost of the municipal government, to provide for good roads, lighting and fire department and to reduce the burdens of the taxpayers. A further loss is soon apparent in the mercantile business to the merchant, manufacturer and working man alike. For liquor and other large amounts of merchandise, amounting to many thousands of dollars are purchased in the neighboring towns. For liquor under no-license is drauk just the same, only the stronger drink as whiskey and other strong liquors take the place of the lighter beverages. The moral status of the community is also largely impaired for it drives the sale of strong drink into the

The opinions of many of the most eminent clergymen such as the late Bishop Potter of New York, Caradinl Gibbons, Bishop Crafton of Wisconsin, Bishop Hall of Vermont, the late Archbishop Ryan, Ex-Governor Russell of Mass. are all to the effect that a well regulated licensed saloon is preferable to the illicit sale of liquor in kitchen dives and cellars, the consequences of no-li-

The state of Alabama, the home of Hobson, the most prominent prohibition advocate, which a few years ago tried prohibition, repealed the same afterwards with a large majority in spite of the gigantic efforts of the prohibition advocates. The past year Alabama turned Mr. Hobson down as a candidate for the United States Senatorship, plainly showing that this state does

not wish any more of his prohibition doctrines. Here and there the prohibitionist succeeds in turning a city or state, but as stated for Worcester, they do not long stay in the prohibition column.

Our large surrounding cities as Hartford, Springfield, etc., had the same question under consideration and voted every time with large majorities for license. Why not be guided by the judgment of our prosperous neighbors?
