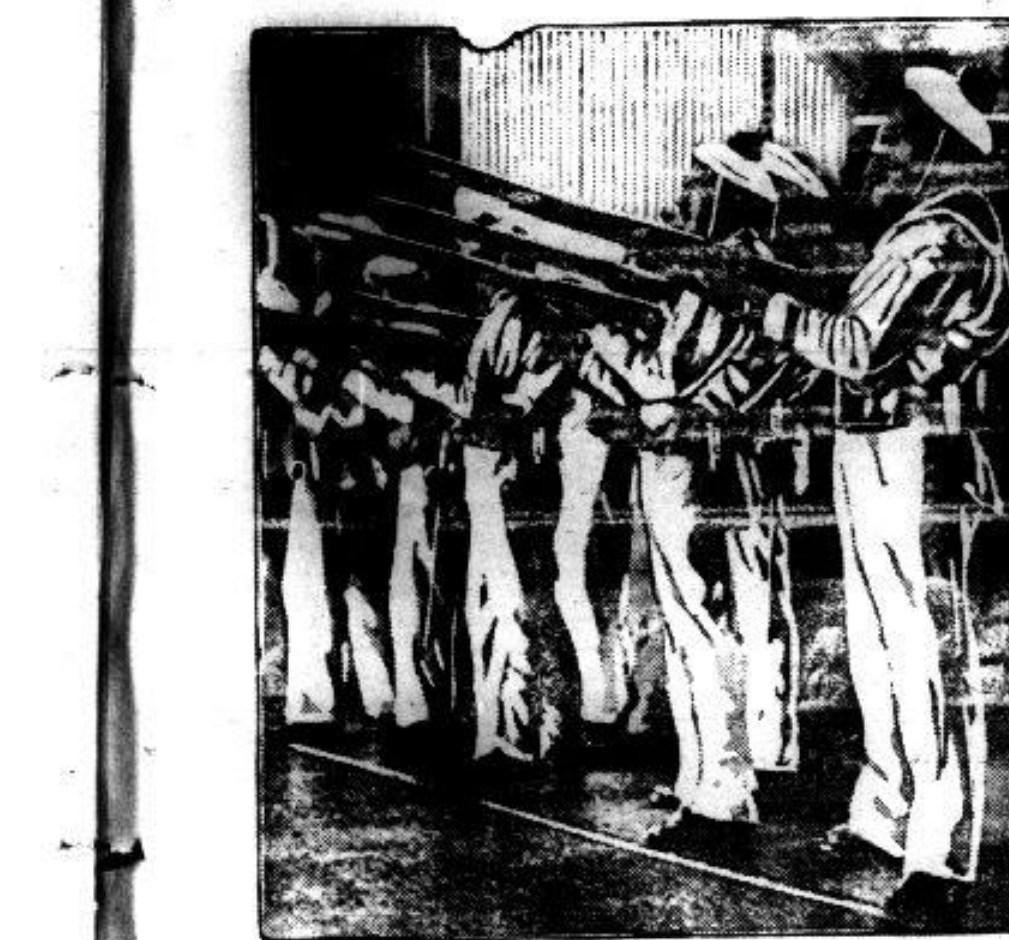

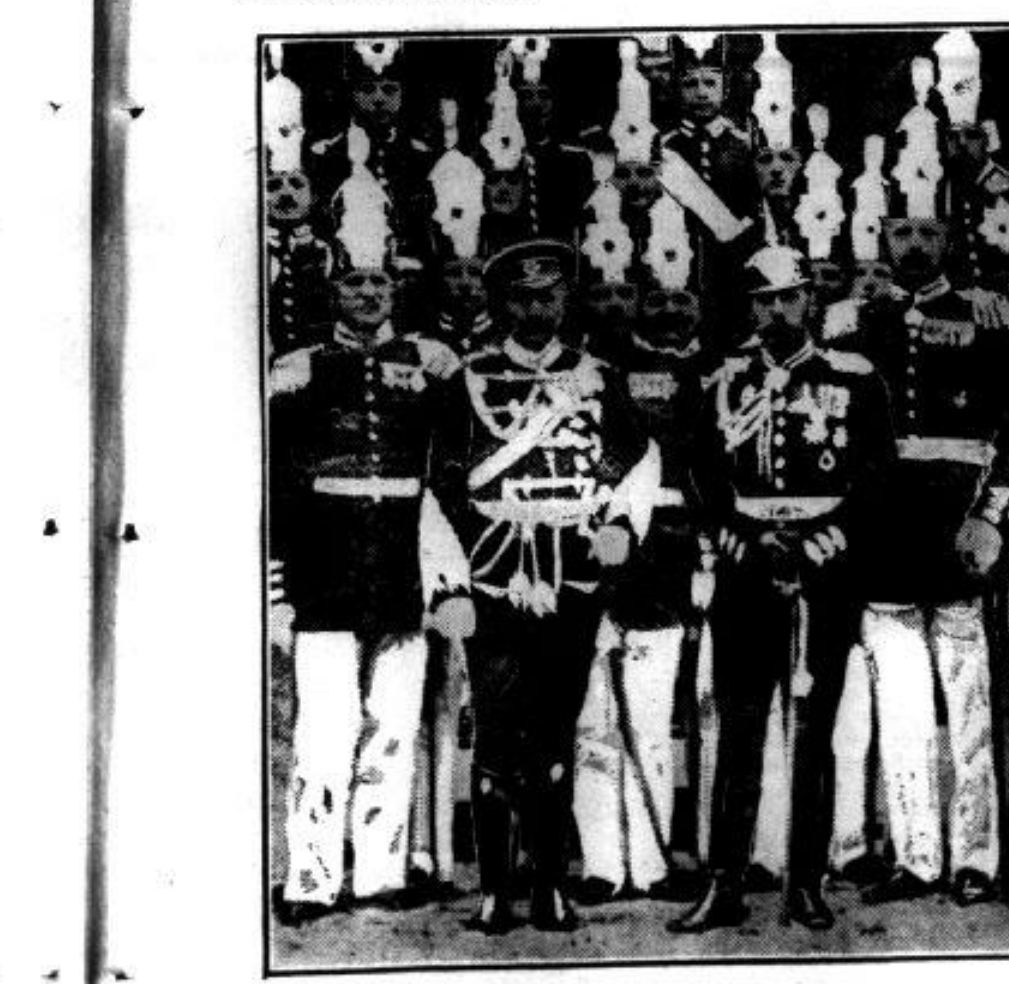

REPUBLICAN RALLY

AT TINKER HALL WEDNESDAY EVENING FIRST AND LAST OF CAMPAIGN

Addresses Made By Local and Out-of-Town Politicians. Voters Urged to Support Republican Candidates at Polls Next Tuesday

Mr. Cheney spoke pleasantly in a reminiscent vein of the good old town of Manchester where he was born and of the people in it for whom he bore kindly remembrances.

Attorney Henry H. Hunt of South Manchester urged the voters of Manchester to aid in the election of all the republican candidates at the election next Tuesday.

Dr. Harry Oakley of Hartford, republican candidate for member of congress from the First Connecticut District gave a good talk outlining the course he would pursue if elected to that office next Tuesday. He asked the support of the voters of this town and on his part gave every assurance of capable filling the position in the interest of the entire constituency.

W. S. Hyde, local candidate for representative on the republican list closed the discussions by predicting a substantial majority for all the republican candidates.

LONERGAN HITS BACK

CONGRESSMAN TAKES EXCEPTION TO REPORTED STATEMENT MADE HERE

No Appropriations for Federal Buildings Made By Present Congress This Session—Ninety Thousand Dollar Appropriation Assured for Manchester

At his headquarters in Hartford today Congressman Augustine Lonergan was informed that a citizen made a statement at the republican rally in Tinker Hall, Wednesday evening, to the effect that the congressman could have secured favorable action at the present congress on the appropriation bill for a federal building for Manchester if the building was not under the present congress.

"My attention has been called to newspaper reports to the effect that a statement was made Wednesday evening at a public meeting in Manchester that an appropriation for a federal building for Manchester might be introduced in the present congress. I am sorry to hear that such a statement was made. Surely the gentleman, if correctly reported, is unintentionally in error, for everybody knows that so far during the present session of congress there hasn't been

"I have in my possession a letter from the Hon. Frank Clark, chairman of the house committee on public buildings and grounds. This committee has the Manchester bill, Hartford's \$225,000 post office site item, and all other public buildings bills for the United States before it. I am a member of this committee, and am ranking member of the sub-committee which has charge of all public buildings bills for Connecticut. Chairman Clark wrote me under date of October 6, 1914:

"As you know, it has been the custom of congress for years past to have an omnibus public buildings bill covering the entire country once each two years, and as we had one of these general bills on March 4, 1913, we could not introduce a bill for another until another March 1915.

"As chairman Clark clearly states, there was no omnibus public buildings bill so far in this congress. Therefore, the Manchester bill could not have been passed, no matter what sum was asked for. I have Chairman Clark's assurance in writing that the Manchester appropriation of \$20,000 and the Hartford appropriation of \$225,000 will be included in the omnibus bill to be drawn at the December session."
