

While the police were searching for the bandit he entered the Liberty Banking and Savings company, fired two shots, which missed, at Cashier Winters, grabbed \$5100 in currency, ran to his automobile and again fied. Almost two hours later Hohl was located in an apartment house and in a battle with the police Patrolman Knoid was probably mortally wounded. The desperado again entered the automobile, but in rounding a corner the machine crashed into a telegraph pole and was wrecked. The bandit

opened fire on the other two officers who had pursued him. In the fusiliade that followed Hobi fell with four bullet wounds in his body and died shortly afterward.

reparing Legal Notifications To Landowners About This-Twelve Hours Allowed After Storm Ceases New By-Law In Effect On Receipt of Notice

forms printed for the purpose of notifying property owners having permanent sidewalks in front of their real holdings to remove all snow or ice from such walks within 12 hours after the snow ceases falling. Failing in this the snow and ice are to be removed by town workmen and the cost of same taxed upon the property. Where it is not practicable to remove ice and snow as above the property owner is to cause sand, gravel or ashes to be sprinkled upon such walks in order to amply protect pedestrians using same. The order of the selectmen will be in effect as soon as the legal notices are served. It will be necessary for the selectmer to issue but one such notice each property owner liable to the provisions of this town ordin-

ance.
